## Recycling:

NEPRESSO: Many of you will have a Nespresso coffee pod machine at home, in your caravan or holiday home. The used pods are recyclable and the Visitor Centre has a box to put them in. **Only the Nespresso brand pods can be collected for recycling.** The reason for this is that they are made entirely from Aluminium (unlike some other brands, apparently). You can collect your pods in any sort of container, which can be placed in the box, but when you order or purchase your next coffee pods, check out the recycling bag available from Nespresso.

The white plastic cube in the yard at the side of the Centre is for you to place any dry, flatpacked newspapers, cardboard (secured with string) etc. for recycling. If the container is full, please leave your paper bundles under the shelter.

Soft plastics can also be placed in the container, but it is important that these are **clean and appropriately packed**, or this service will be discontinued. It is important to recycle as much as we can to reduce the amount of rubbish going into landfill so if you are unable to deliver your papers to the yard, please place in your yellow recycling bin

#### Please note that our Centre does not have a facility for bottles and cans.

Stansbury has a bottle and can recycling depot - "Stansbury Recycling" - for all your refundable items and glass bottles. Alternatively, they can be placed in the "cages" dotted around town and the blue and yellow bins in the Caravan Parks, the proceeds of which are distributed to those community groups and sporting clubs who participate in the collection.

The Visitor Information Centre has a "Planet Ark" recycling box for all your used printer cartridges as well as a container for recycling the following items:

# Please note that we no longer accept plastic screw lids or any Colgate products.

#### We will still be able to recycle:

- The little plastic bread bag sealers.
- Aluminium can pull tabs.
- All blister packs
- Used biros no ink.

#### STANSBURY MUSEUM

Witnessing all the activity of the recent grain harvest on the Peninsula made me think of the hard work of our farmers and their families. It also got me thinking about their forebears and the challenges they faced to exist and succeed. So often, successful farming is and was a true partnership of a husband and wife. As well as celebrating our farmers, the museum acknowledges and celebrates the contribution of women on the farm.

The museum has a copy of a fascinating, hand written, historical account written in 1980 by a Stansbury local, Hazel Colwell (nee Bowman).

The original is in the Mortlock Library (ref D6679) due to its significance as a historical record and social commentary on life in the early days of country South Australia. It documents the experiences over the years of Hazel and her family who began farming from the early 1900s about 7 ½ miles (12 km) from Stansbury.

Hazel describes her mother's life on the farm as a young wife and mother. Prior to her marriage, her mother was a music and singing teacher in Kadina which even at that time was considered a large country town.

Contrast this young woman with Hazel's account of her mother helping her husband to do some repairs to their well on the farm to save paying someone else to do them. Her mother had to lower her husband down the well in a bucket. In the midst of the repair, her husband accidentally tipped out of the bucket and ended up on the bottom of the well. She never understood how she got the strength to haul her husband and the bucket filled with water, to the top.

Hazel also says that if her mother wanted meat for dinner, she had to go outside to the tree in the yard where a carcass was suspended using a pulley system, let it down, cut off the piece she wanted and chop it with a tomahawk. Both Hazel and her mother helped round up the sheep and were very busy during shearing. She recalls both her parents being out before daylight picking fruit before their day's work on the farm began. Her mother taught music to supplement the farm income at times, just as some farmers wives do today.

The museum shines light on the life of men and women and children and their many roles on the farms, in their homes and in the community.

Come to the museum and discover our interesting past that has laid the foundation for our community today.
