Sadly, it was with great disappointment that the Saltwater Classic Organising Committee made the decision to cancel the Wooden Boat Regatta event planned for 2 and 3 April 2022. This was based on several factors, but mainly the requirement to comply with a Covid Management Plan and the lack of participants willing to commit to attend the event due to the ongoing uncertainty of Covid restrictions. These factors made the Organising Committee's planning very difficult and the outcome unpredictable. As a result of the event cancellation, the scheduled supporting Seaside Market which was to be held on Saturday 2 April has also been cancelled.

Street Banners.

Recycling:

NEPRESSO: Many of you will have a Nespresso coffee pod machine at home, in your caravan or holiday home. The used pods are recyclable and the Visitor Centre has a box to put them in. **Only the Nespresso brand pods can be collected for recycling.** The reason for this is that they are made entirely from Aluminium (unlike some other brands, apparently). You can collect your pods in any sort of container, which can be placed in the box, but when you order or purchase your next coffee pods, check out the recycling bag available from Nespresso.

The white plastic cube in the yard at the side of the Centre is for you to place any dry, flat-packed newspapers, cardboard (secured with string) etc. for recycling. If the container is full, please leave your paper bundles under the shelter.

Soft plastics can also be placed in the container, but it is important that these are **clean and appropriately packed**, or this service will be discontinued. It is important to recycle as much as we can to reduce the amount of rubbish going into landfill so if you are unable to deliver your papers to the yard, please place in your yellow recycling bin

Please note that our Centre does not have a facility for bottles and cans.

Stansbury has a bottle and can recycling depot - "Stansbury Recycling" - for all your refundable items and glass bottles. Alternatively, they can be placed in the "cages" dotted around town and the blue and yellow bins in the Caravan Parks, the proceeds of which are distributed to those community groups and sporting clubs who participate in the collection.

The Visitor Information Centre has a "Planet Ark" recycling box for all your used printer cartridges as well as a container for recycling the following items:

Please note that we no longer accept plastic screw lids or any Colgate products.

We will still be able to recycle:

- The little plastic bread bag sealers.
- Aluminium can pull tabs.
- All blister packs.
- Used biros no ink.



So you've finally decide to get yourself that new puppy or kitten to brighten things up after the gloom of the past few years. You've seen a picture online of the cutest puppy/kitten that's just has BUY ME written all over it.

Be very careful, it could be a scam.

The scam is a relatively simple one. The scammers use reputable online sales sites such as Marketplace or Gumtree and place a photo of the cute puppy or kitten, often a purebred but even increasingly so called 'rescue' dogs or on occasion a 'free' dog. Once you've paid for the dog there will then be ongoing charges for transport, crates, immunisations etc etc etc until you finally realise there is no puppy and the scammer will cuts contact.

Once you've made contact they'll often ask a series of questions in relation to your capacity to care for the puppy/kitten, don't be fooled, these are purely to lull you into a false sense of security. There may well be a professional looking website with lots of pictures, this could well be a legitimate breeders work that has been copied by the scammer, because the scammer doesn't actually have a puppy/kitten to sell to you.

To avoid being scammed

- Do a reverse image search on the pictures in the ad. If they are attached to another site BIG RED FLAG!
- How long has the website been online Look it up at <u>www.whois.com</u> If its only been online for a very short time - RED FLAG!
- For pedigreed breeds Is there a big discount for the puppy/kitten compared to what they would normally cost from a reputable Breeder? RED FLAG!
- If there is a Australian National Kennel Club or Breeder association number look it up online and make contact though the email/phone number listed on the site.
- Do they have an ABN? Look it up at <u>https://abr.business.gov.au</u>.
- Do they have a business name? Look it up at https://asic.gov.au
- For 'rescues' check what shelter they belong too and search online and call to verify the shelter exists and the puppy/kitten exists also.
- RED FLAG Does the breeder only wish to communicate via text or email? If they won't talk to you via phone then forget about it, probably a scam.
- Ask the breeder/seller for a video call to see the puppy/kitten and its parents. If they refuse (no matter what the reason!) then BIG RED FLAG! forget it.
- There are sites online dedicated to recording the scam websites but these are not always up to date. Usually once they have been registered on a site like that the scammer shuts it down and changes its name and starts again. But they do contain lots of information about how to recognise a scam.

So what happens when you send your money to a scammer? Usually you will have transferred the money via Bank Transfer into account details provided by the scammer. This account will sometimes be in the name of a victim of identity theft or an account sold off by a departing temporary Australian resident. The money will then likely be moved on into a Crypto currency account making it impossible to trace. Within minutes your money is gone, often to the other side of the world long before there is any chance for the bank to freeze it or for law enforcement to re-trieve it.

It's very much a case of BUYER BEWARE!

STANSBURY MUSEUM

Rowena Smith

I have recently been privileged to drive around Stansbury and surrounds with Mr Dean Agnew whose family have farmed locally for 5 generations. He shared his memories and observations, in particular as a school boy in the 1930's and 40's. . To do justice to Dean's generous sharing, I will transcribe the recordings of this trip for the museum and also base other articles on this information.

He kindly allowed me access to a diary he started with a few entries in 1942 and then added to substantially in 1943. It was written in pen and ink in neat cursive handwriting in a small Education Department of South Australia issued, grey, lined exercise book with the title "Our School NOTE BOOK" which cost 1½ pence. This diary gives a wonderful snapshot of the life of an 11year old school boy living in a rural South Australian community during World War 2. His entries, often complete with pencil drawn illustration, mention family events, his friends and their interests and escapades, local events, both social and newsworthy, farm life, the weather and the war. Initially Dean rode his pushbike to Stansbury School from the farm originally known as Hickman's which became Rosedene. Later in primary school, he rode from the Beechwood farm along the gravel road which is now the sealed Main Coast Road.

On the 14th July 1943 Dean wrote

"Sicily has been invaded. Mr S from Yorketown was found dead in the scrub. There was a NASTY HEAD WIND to push against yesterday. All the girls in Grade V11 are buying marbles off me."

Marbles were obviously much played and traded by young Dean. They rate several mentions throughout the diary.

The weather too rates many mentions. Clearly it was hard work riding his push bike against the nasty head wind as he emphasised it in capital letters. Rainfall totals are frequently mentioned as are the wind and its impact, like when the wind blew the door off the lavatory on a neighbour's farm.

On October 12th 1943 he writes

"Friday night there was a terrible strong wind blowing and rain fell. We got 24 points. At Port Vincent, 2 ketches were in and the wind blew them against each other and one sunk with a full load of wheat on. The one that still floated was damaged more than the one that went down."

Throughout the diary there are references to the war in Europe and its leaders, for example on 24th February Dean wrote "Mr Churchill is ill but is still carrying on his work in his bedroom" and on 7th December 1943 he noted "Mr Roosevelt, Mr Churchill, Mr Stalin and Mr Chiang Kai Shek are having a conference."

Dean doesn't recall getting that information from newspapers but rather from listening to the radio with the family.

Dean mentions good times he had with his mates as well as the more serious issues affecting the country and the world. He talked of going to Barry's birthday tea and "playing hidee, Monopoly and Ghosts" and "went down to the chalk caves on Saturday and we had a lot of fun running through the passages". Spotlighting and trapping rabbits were also favourite pastimes.

Farm animals are often mentioned like the new bully calf born to Midget, his cow, the foal and the cat that had 5 kittens. He also tells of "going flat out" on the Douglas motor bike and riding horses down to Long Beach with mates.

Dean talks about "the frolic" where "Graham was a rabbit and I was a chinaman" .He also says that he "went to the pictures at Yorketown" and the local "show".

On 7th September 1943, Dean writes "On Sunday Auntie Eva had a baby girl much to my disgust". As he had a swag of girl cousins at the time that didn't impress young Dean at all although he did mention that changed later in his teenage years.

One regular observation and diary entry Dean makes in 1943 was of seeing training aeroplanes "hedge hopping" (flying at very low altitude) across the sea, the cliffs and the farmland near Stansbury. This together with other reminiscences about the wartime in Stansbury, I'll save for next months Scribble.
