RECYCLING

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biro's – no ink. **However, we are no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.** Unfortunately, we are not able to recycle batteries.

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. *You could save a life!*





150 FACTS ABOUT STANSBURY: Facts 16-45 (2x 15)

16. In 1878 the first councillors, F Wurm, C Hepenstall, H Lewis and FB Fowler were elected. The first Public School with residence attached was built in 1878 with Mr FW Kruger as the teacher. The cost was £801.2.6.
The Anglican Church started as a small wood and iron structure and the first service was held in 1878. Later in 1898 a solid stone building was erected.
17. A Police Trooper was stationed in Stansbury in 1879.
A manual telephone exchange operated by a telephonist was housed in a small room in the original post office and began in 1879.
18. The original cemetery was sited on the top of the hill above the present cemetery. It is known that two burials occurred there in 1874 and 1876. As the ground was stony a more suitable site was found and the Council took control of the present cemetery in 1881.
19. In 1882 Miss Grace Kerr was appointed to the school on a salary of £116.00 per year. At that time there were 34 students on the roll.
20. In 1883 the Destitute Board allotted £10 per annum as a salary to the medical officer for caring for destitute children and aborigines in the district.
21. The first Institute was built at a cost of £400 in 1884 in First St., now St. Vincent St,.
22. In 1887 250 trees were planted around the cemetery.
Dalrymple Motors was originally a flourishing blacksmiths business in 1887.
23. George Pitt set up a coach building, blacksmith and wheelwright's business in 1889 on what is now known as Anzac Parade.
Captain Germein gave the galley of the "Ceres" in 1889 to be erected on the shore end of the old jetty.
24. Alfred Weaver died at the age of 89 years in 1891.
25. The first butcher shop was located on the corner of Ceres and St. Vincent St and traded from 1892.
26. In 1898 ten acres of land was granted for the recreation ground.
Albert Pitt established a lime-burning industry in 1898.
A horse was used for the first time for trucking on the jetty in 1898.
27. A Tennis club was possibly in existence as early as 1900 with the game being played on dirt courts situated on the east side of the recreation ground.
28. The present IGA store was built and operated as a shop from 1904 and has remained a General Store ever since.
29. In 1905 the Council office was transferred to Oaklands.
Notice posted on the jetty in 1905: Men and boys are allowed to bathe between the hours of 5.00pm to 9.00am in suitable apparel. "Ladies Reserve" south of this notice.
In 1905 a new Jetty 1010 ft long was constructed – it was necessary for the deeper water to accommodate larger steamers.

30. In 1907 Stansbury Football Club won their first premiership in the SYP Association. There may have been a team three or four years earlier.
31. In 1908 a cricket club was formed.
In 1908 Council agreed to donate £5.00 annually to the hospital.
Albert Pitt purchased the horse stables belonging to the original Dalrymple Hotel on the corner of Towler and Ceres St and converted them to a plaster factory in 1908.
32. In 1909 the present Primary School was built after the original was considered to be distinctly overcrowded.
34. The Institute was deemed to be too small and a new building was officially opened on 16th March 1910.
Mr George Sherriff retired from Council in 1910 after serving 32 years as Chairman.
The Department of Education provided a new school in 1910 after the original school had been condemned.
35. The original hand painted stage backdrop in the Institute was installed in 1911 and is still hanging today.
36. In the 1911/12 cricket season Cecil Nankivell was the first Stansbury player to score a century.
37. The cricket club won their first premiership in the 1913/14 season with Cecil topping the Association bowling with 69 wickets.
38. In 1913 the Adelaide Cement Company commenced operations near the present jetty. The successful contractor for the transport of stone across the gulf was paid 3/- a ton. Owing to repeated epidemics, school work had been sadly interfered with and the school was closed for a period of time in 1913.
39. The first quarry manager was George Bull who had joined the company in 1914.
40. Stansbury had an excellent Brass Band in the early part of the century. It is known that in 1914 there were about 17 members.
41. A highlight of the 1914 sporting season was a boat trip to Streaky Bay where games of football and cricket were played with Stansbury winning both.
42. Alf Sprigg was granted permission to graze cattle in the streets up until noon each day – this occurred in 1915.
43. “Please Slow Down” notices were erected on the Minlaton and Yorketown approaches to Stansbury.
44. A Rifle Club was formed in 1917.
45. In 1919 because of clay content, the shallowness of water and the closeness to the township, the Adelaide Cement Company quarry was transferred four miles south to Klein’s Point. The following year a jetty was built resulting in faster and easier loading.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

Many of you will have noticed raffle tickets being sold beside our busy stall at the last Stansbury market.

Thank you for supporting another arm of our fundraising. Our volunteers work so hard to fundraise with our regular market stall, the annual raffle and occasional catering. Why!!!! What are the funds raised used for???

The funds raised are a significant contribution to the total income of the museum. The other main source of income is the entrance fee charged to view the museum. These are deliberately kept at a modest affordable price (\$3 per adult, \$1 per child, \$7 per family) to allow as many people as possible to enjoy the museum. Other sources of income are donations and grants which are applied for and received for specific projects.

Many functions of maintaining the museum building, grounds and exhibits are carried out by volunteers but some like regular white ant inspections and fire equipment checks need to be done and certified by experts at a cost.

Volunteers open the museum twice weekly all year round and every day during the January school holiday. They also open at other times on request. Volunteers also clean the museum and all the exhibits and do the gardening.

All exhibits are curated by volunteers. This involves receiving and accepting the donated items, organising them for display, maintaining the displays and also record keeping. Volunteers are supplied with uniform shirts and badges and some have role specific training provided. They have access to basic refreshments (cuppa and biscuit) when they volunteer. The small amount of costs to the museum to support volunteers is far outweighed by the amount of money they save the museum by their labour.

Other day to day costs the museum incurs are for stationery, laminating and printing, computing, cleaning, painting, and pest control.

The Yorke Peninsula Council own the museum building and leases it to the museum for an annual fee and whilst annual rates do not have to be paid, a yearly rubbish pick up fee is paid. Two other vital services that need to be paid are internet connection (for email and research) and electricity.

Paid advertising in Yorke Peninsula Country Times, and also in special interest publications which helps encourage visitors to visit is also a major expenditure.

Regulatory and safety requirements can incur, both ongoing costs and one off costs, for example COVID compliance during the pandemic incurred unanticipated costs.

Fundraising equipment (e.g BBQ's, trestles, urns, gazebos) need transporting to events. The museum has a trailer to do this and it needs to be registered and insured.

The museum needs to fundraise to ensure that it has funds to meet all its outgoings, both regular and capital, and to be able to grow and survive into the future.

Stansbury Museum would like to thank all who support our fundraising efforts

We also applaud our volunteers whose contribution to the museum is immense and invaluable

We would like to acknowledge, with great respect, the contribution made by the late Bob Jung to the museum. He contributed countless man hours, ingenuity, knowledge and donated exhibits. He hand crafted many of the display cases, mainly from recycled wood at minimal cost to the museum.

To Summarise All the Scam Watch advice, here are some Golden Rules for SCAM avoidance

Never allow anybody else to access your online banking. Not friends, not family, not random strangers on the phone/internet.

NEVER click on links in texts advising that your accounts/Paypal/Amazon have been fraudulently accessed. Ring your bank/financial institution directly if you are concerned. Banks will NEVER put a link in a legitimate text advising you of suspect activity.

DO NOT transfer your money to an account opened by someone you have only spoken to on the phone 'to keep it safe'. Vast sums can be lost that way.

-Never allow anyone to remotely access your computer/phone/tablet. Don't install software on your device at someone else's direction unless you are 100% sure of their identity. A random somebody claiming to be from your bank is not that person!

Set up two factor authentication on your accounts, learn how it works and NEVER provide the authentication codes to anyone else.

Treat with great, huge, massive (am I making the point here) suspicion any calls or Facebook ads that tell you that you can make easy money by investing in share trading/crypto. They lie!! If you wish to invest, research a legitimate share trading/investment platform.

If you are buying/selling online in forums such as Gumtree/Marketplace contact your bank and learn about PayID. It's a scam prevention tool that is worth knowing about. DO NOT let someone online "help" you to do this. PayID is FREE, don't let anyone tell you differently.

If you use online selling forums be very careful about payments. Screen shots of payment details should be treated like mirages. Check your own account before releasing goods.

Pet Scams are highly prevalent. Contact breeders associations to find legitimate breeders.

Never transfer money to random Bank Accounts as a result of receiving a text message from a supposed loved one whose lost a phone or left a card at home. Hey Mum, it's A SCAM!

Transferring a large sum to a third party you don't commonly transact with? Make a phone call to check the payment details on any emailed invoice. This prevents email interception scams.

Romance scams – the hardest of all to prevent. We all want to be loved, and love can be blind (and deaf and wilfully self-deceptive), but if your new online romantic interest starts asking for money then you deserve better. Move on to someone who genuinely wants you, and is not just saying what you want to hear to get your money.

Be Scam Aware – The weak link in any protection system is likely to be a human being ... By staying aware you reduce the chances of losing your money.
