RECYCLING

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. **However, we are no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.** Unfortunately, we are not able to recycle batteries.

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. *You could save a life!*

150 FACTS ABOUT STANSBURY: Facts 106 – 135 (2 x 15)

106. A Columbarium was built at the Cemetery in 1991. Thirty years later a second one was built alongside it on the southern side.
A floating pontoon, named Brundell's Landing was installed at the boat ramp in 1991.
107. In 1992 the Women's A Grade Basketball team won the SYP Premiership for the 13th time in 14 years. They continued this amazing success winning 16 premierships from 1998-99
108. In 1993 the Community Church was opened in Weaver Street
109. The first Sheep Dog Trials and Country Fair sponsored by the Progress Association was held in 1994.
Curramulka, Minlaton and Stansbury Football and Netball Clubs amalgamated to form the CMS Crows.
110. The light which was originally located on the end of the jetty was relocated by the museum in 1995.
111. In 1996 the first Engine Rally, which proved to be a great success was organized by the Museum.
112. The amalgamation of the District Council of Yorketown, Warooka, Minlaton and Maitland Councils occurred in 1997.
A new shed funded by the CFS Board was opened in 1997 on land formerly owned by the SA Police Dept. The Stansbury 24 Unit was commissioned at the same time.
113. In 1998 the town celebrated 125 years of settlement.
114. A Speedboat Regatta was revitalized in 1999 and exceeded expectations with an estimated crowd of 3000.
The Golf Club celebrated its 75th anniversary.
115. The last original weatherboard home built in Stansbury in 1876 was demolished in 2000 to make way for a new residence.
116. In 2001 the Pioneer Hall at Elanora was extended to become the meeting place for the local RSL Branch.
117. In 2002 bowler Lindsay Jones won the Club's Singles Championship for the fourth time, the latter being three in a row, a club record.
The "In-Betweens", an informative and social group was formed in 2002, and this was followed two years later by a Tia Chi Group which provided the physical activity.
118. The School celebrated 125 years of education in 2003.
Frank Evans at 95 years of age retired in 2003 as the community librarian.
The inaugural Stansbury & Port Vincent Wooden and Classic Boats Regatta was held in 2003.
119. The Cricket Club won the 2003-04 grand final after 54 years.
Ray Agnew was awarded an OAM in the Queen's Birthday Honours in 2004.

120. In 2005 the Bowling Club celebrated its 50th anniversary.
121. Bernie Vince was drafted to the Adelaide Crows in 2006 having played only four SANFL games.
122. Eldercare took over the operation of "Elanora" in 2007.
123. In 2008 the Lions Club of Stansbury Dalrymple was established.
Stansbury was awarded the Best Medium Town for 2008 in the KESAB Tidy Towns Award.
124. The Primary School won the "Young Legends" award at the KESAB National Presentation ceremony in Canberra in 2009.
125. The Stansbury Institute (in Weaver St.) celebrated its centenary in 2010.
126. The Progress Association purchased the Post Office building in 2011 to be used as a Visitor Centre. Previously it had been rented.
The introduction of evening meals during the bowls season resulted in the kitchen being gutted and upgraded in 2011.
127. An Emergency Defibrillator Machine was installed at the office in the Foreshore Caravan Park in 2012. Since then others have been positioned at the Oyster Point Drive Park, Pharmacy, Bowling Club, Golf Club and on the CFS truck.
128. The 1st Division Men's Bowling team won the 2012-13 SYP Premiership, the first in 16 years. Kenn Rogers was inducted into the Bowls Hall of Fame in 2013 and the installation of solar panels was completed at the Bowling Club.
Gaye Jolly celebrated 40 years of playing netball and basketball.
129. The Harbour Memorial Board, placed near the jetty in 2014 was donated by the Lions Club.
130. "Walk the Yorke" was officially opened in 2015.
131. At the Bowling Club a new synthetic turf green was opened in 2016, allowing the greens to be accessible at anytime of the year.
After 141 years the Stanbury Christian Church closed in 2016.
The "Rusty and Dusty" was held in conjunction with the Seaside Markets for the first time.
132. Storms described as nearly cyclonic were experienced early in 2017 when the town recorded their average monthly rainfall in less than 24 hours.
133. The local Crocodile Hunters and Liars Club celebrated 12 years by embracing the charity Movember.
134. In 2018 the CFS station qualified as having the oldest average age of 68 years in the region.
135. A plaque, listing all those who registered in Stansbury during WW II, was unveiled at the Memorial Tree in 2019. The new upgraded memorial had been dedicated in 2015.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

In years gone by, most farms and many households kept chickens for egg supply and also for eating. Often keeping chickens was a good way to supplement farm income by selling eggs to local townsfolk.

To increase the number of chickens you had and to increase production, you needed to either buy more or to allow eggs to hatch. Incubators were used to keep eggs at the correct temperature for hatching.

In the large rear shed at the museum are two great examples of Lanyons Hot Water Incubators, one larger commercial style and the other a smaller version that may have been a home version. Incubators of this style were common in early last century and in their hey day in the 1930's in Australia. They were built by Lanyon and Sons at Keswick who made incubators, brooders and ice chests. Lanyon and Sons successfully expanded to establish a factory at Parramatta in Sydney. Interestingly the South Australian company was thought to be acquired by Gourlay Cabinets which became part of Peters commercial refrigeration.

To look at, these incubators are essentially stained wooden cabinets with a small heating unit on the side. They are so nicely crafted that they could almost be mistaken for a piece of household furniture. Inside, a metal tank runs the full length of the cabinet. Water is piped in to a thermostatically controlled heating unit which sits on the outside of the cabinet. The unit was fuelled by burning "lighting kerosene" and the resultant flame had a shutter over it which controlled the height of the flame and its heat.

The eggs were placed in the tray and needed to be manually turned between two and four times a day for sixteen—eighteen days days depending on the size of the egg and breed of the fowl or duck. There was a warm top section where the newly hatched chicks were kept for a few days before being moved into the normal chicken run. Here the chicks were kept warm and free from draughts whilst still being able to feed and scratch.

The museum is fortunate to have original pamphlets which came with the incubators with instructions and even advertising "add ons" that for a price could be supplied with the incubators, for example four foot wire runs cost one pound and a six foot wire run set you back one pound and 10 shillings. You could also purchase a "run down board" so that the chicks could run down the board into a wire run or yard. The "run down board" was advertised as allowing "great exercise" for the chicks.

These days modern incubators automatically turn the eggs and are powered by electricity, use LED heating lights and have digital information screens. They are also much smaller, lighter units –easily portable compared to the large sturdy wooden cabinets of the Lanyons Hot Water Incubators.

These Lanyon Hot Water incubators show how chicks were hatched prior to electric and digital technology and using materials readily available at the time.

The museum has a great collection of articles on display that over the years have come from the local farming community and it celebrates the contribution that agriculture and farmers have made to Stansbury.

Come and explore, reminisce, be excited and amazed! There is something for everyone, young and old, at Stansbury Museum.
