As we welcome the many visitors, and new home/holiday owners to our beautiful township, we thought it would be a good opportunity to provide some background information on our Association, its role in our community, and some of the projects which have been undertaken in recent times.

Stansbury Progress Association Inc. is an organisation whose members are derived from the Stansbury district. The Association commenced back in 1932 and was incorporated in June 2010.

The objectives of the Association include:

Advancing and protecting the interests of the Stansbury Township and surrounding district.

Overseeing the care and management of the business of the Stansbury Institute. Encouraging and fostering other societies or clubs which may be for the benefit of the township of Stansbury and district.

Management of the Stansbury Caravan Parks.

Running of the Southern Yorke Peninsula Visitor Information Office.

Assisting and co-operating with Council.

Maintain and manage the assets of the Association.

Promote the Township of Stansbury.

The Executive Committee is made up of 10 volunteers whose role is to manage the Association in accordance with the Constitution. Each committee member serves a two year term, with elections held every year in August via the Annual Elector's Meeting.

The Association is focussed on improving the township of Stansbury. The Tidy Towns Group is a group of 20 volunteers with a large variety of skills, who meet every week on a Tuesday. The group is funded by the Association, and is very active in maintaining various garden beds, the Oyster Point Drive Foreshore, the large street pot plants, carrying out repairs and maintenance to infrastructure such as the flagpole, maintaining the Stansbury Seaside Market stallholder sites, carrying out some repair work after storm damage or weather events, and assisting local clubs or organisations with their working bees.

The Association runs two businesses: the Southern Yorke Peninsula Visitor Information Centre, as well as leasing the Stansbury Caravan Parks from the Yorke Peninsula Council.

Stansbury Caravan Parks: This involves managing both the Stansbury Foreshore Caravan Park, and the Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park. Revenue generated from this venture is reinvested back into the general maintenance and improvements of the parks, running the Southern Yorke Peninsula Visitor Information Centre, funding the Stansbury Tidy Towns Group and channelled back into the community through donations, upgrade and supply of infrastructure and other town projects. Without income from the caravan park, the Association would rely solely on fundraising and community grants as sources of revenue.

The Stansbury Caravan Parks are a major drawcard for Stansbury and the wider district. The Foreshore Park is in a prime position, overlooking Oyster Bay. However, in order for the park to remain attractive to guests in what is a very competitive market, it is important that the infrastructure and offerings of the park appeal to, and provide value for money for, potential guests.

The Stansbury Caravan Parks are a major drawcard for Stansbury and the wider district. The Foreshore Park is in a prime position, overlooking Oyster Bay. However, in order for the park to remain attractive to guests in what is a very competitive market, it is important that the infrastructure and offerings of the park appeal to, and provide value for money for, potential guests.

Progress has undertaken many improvement projects at the parks including refurbishing most of the existing cabins and villas, installing a brand new playground in each park, building a new camp kitchen in the Foreshore Park, replacing the amenities roof and installing solar panels in both parks. This is in addition to the standard day to day operational and maintenance costs required to run the parks.

In response to the consistent demand for self-contained accommodation, three brand new villas have just been delivered to the Foreshore Caravan Park. These will add a luxury accommodation option for guests, with one villa offering three bedrooms, and two villas with two bedrooms. Three of the existing cabins were moved over to the Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park to make way for the new villas. This provides further self-contained accommodation in the budget range at the Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, which previously did not have this option available. One of these cabins will be pet friendly, another first for our parks.

This is an exciting project, and we hope to welcome many new visitors to the park to enjoy these facilities, as well as all our wonderful regular guests.

Southern Yorke Peninsula Visitor Information Centre: In 2001, the Association commenced using the former Stansbury Post Office building as an office and Tourist Information Centre. This became the Southern Yorke Peninsula Visitor Centre Office in 2006, with Progress purchasing the building in 2011. The Stansbury Tidy Towns Group use the shed as their base and meeting point, and the offices for Progress staff are also located in the Centre. Volunteers man the Centre on weekends during the October-April period, and their assistance during this period is greatly appreciated.

The Centre offers visitors to the region a wide selection of tourism material and souvenirs. We also stock a range of clothing, giftware, local produce, and crafts.

The Stansbury Seaside Markets are important for attracting visitors to the town and district. This is intended to enhance local business opportunities. The markets are run by the Association and are held from October through to April each year. A market co-ordinator is employed by the Association to oversee all the logistics related to running the markets. However, Progress volunteers are instrumental in ensuring each market goes ahead, being responsible for putting out the various signage around town, setting up and taking down the road closures, putting out and collecting the additional bins and manning the information tent at each market. This year the markets were a finalist in the SA Tourism Awards, and are a much-loved event in Stansbury, with a following from not only the local district, but visitors from Adelaide and other parts of the State.

Our local council, Yorke Peninsula Council, is responsible for 5899 square kilometres, including 485km of coastline, however, has less than 1% of the total South Australian population. Funds and resources are limited, regarding the services and infrastructure that can be provided to each township within its boundary. Some services that are on offer by metropolitan councils are not able to be performed by regional councils such as ours. For example, footpath hard rubbish collection does not take place, residents are required to dispose of their own hard rubbish at the local waste centres.

Where possible, Progress Associations in regional areas, assist councils with improving their local town.

Stansbury Progress Association recognise that our council resources are stretched and are pleased to work closely with Council to address local issues, such as general repair work including after storm damage, footpath upgrades, the impact on the increased numbers of Pied Cormorants and the rock revetment wall. A good working relationship with Council is important to ensure Stansbury remains the well-kept, beautiful town that we all enjoy.

Over the years Stansbury Progress Association has been responsible for funding town projects such as installing solar bollard lights along the path in Centenary Park, providing picnic tables in many locations around the town, restoration of the walking track in the "Pines" area, digging out the swimming hole, purchase and maintenance of defibrillators for public use, design and supply of the town banners on various themes, and new equipment for the foreshore playground.

Significant funds have also been contributed towards major projects such as the caravan park groyne, several boat ramp redevelopments, upgrading the War Memorial and contribution towards the initial STED scheme.

Progress was proud to be involved in the Water Tower Mural Trail project. Funding was received through the "Regional Tourism Bushfire Recovery Grant", with additional funds being contributed by Yorke Peninsula Council and Stansbury, Edithburgh, Yorketown, Coobowie, and Port Vincent Progress Associations. This has resulted in four water towers and one water tank boasting wonderful full-scale murals which are a drawcard for the towns involved.

Various donations are made to clubs and organisations including towards the Stansbury and Port Vincent Wooden and Classic Boat Regatta, the Stansbury Oval grandstand repair project, Oval upgrade project, resurfacing of the local tennis/netball courts, providing refurbished computers for the Stansbury Museum and a contribution towards the concreting of a new museum shed, resurfacing the floor in the main Stansbury Institute Hall, upgrade of the front garden for the local CFS, contribution towards a new lawn mower for the Stansbury Golf Club and towards a synthetic green at the Stansbury Bowling Club, and the Stansbury Sports and Community Club Christmas event.

The annual Christmas lights competition is well patronised, with many residents participating in lighting up their homes and gardens with Christmas displays.

New Year's Eve is a highly anticipated event in Stansbury, with the Stansbury Seaside Markets in the morning, the Twilight markets in the evening, and a great firework display at night. Stansbury Progress Association is pleased to be able to provide these events for the whole community to enjoy.

### **RECYCLING**

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available: **Nespresso pods**: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

**Paper/Cardboard:** There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

**Soft plastics:** These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

**Bottles and cans:** Bottles and cans can be placed into the <u>collection cages located around the town</u>, or the <u>blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks</u>. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

**Printer cartridges:** These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. **However, we are no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.** Unfortunately, we are not able to recycle batteries.

#### **EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:**

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. You could save a life!

Continuing last month's theme, I want to talk about another display in the dining room. It is a collection of writing materials of yesteryear when handwriting was an important and essential way of communication and record keeping.

There are pens with nibs, the ink wells in which they were dipped and bottles of ink used to refill the ink wells. The collection of ink wells ranges from very old stoneware, plain utilitarian glass and metal and a white ceramic one decorated with a bird which probably graced a lady's desk. There are also elegant wooden, pewter and glass desk sets.

Mass production of metal nibs began in the 1830's and replaced feathered quills as the common writing tool. They were a revolution at the time and allowed access to writing and education to a greater proportion of the population. Their successor, the reservoir pen later known as the fountain pen was a portable pen with its own ink source. It was invented by the founder of the Waterman Pen Company, Lewis Waterman in 1884. Our display also has fountain pens and cartridges.

Other treasures in the dining room are examples of crockery from the Stansbury Institute which has been a focal point for local events and functions through most of its history. This set of cups, saucers and plates enables 100 people to be served. Extra items have been purchased over the years but have kept a similar design although the originals have the ornate lettering "S I" .They are still in use over 120 years on!

## SC1C Kayt HOWE

Where there are large amounts of money being transferred you can guarantee there are scammers trying to get their greedy little mitts on it.

Businesses that routinely send out invoices for significant sums of money are being targeted by scammers who are intercepting those invoices, changing the banking details and then forwarding them onto the intended recipient.

This is an extremely lucrative scam as the scam victims are actually expecting to receive these invoices and therefore have no hesitation in paying the invoice with the resulting funds disappearing into the accounts of the scammers.

Businesses targeted include builders, solicitors or conveyancers, farm supply stores, machinery sales and trades people. The scammers gain access to the innocent companies email and watch and wait for the invoices to be sent for legitimate purchases, duplicate those invoices with new account details for the payments before forwarding them on.

If you are making a large payment and it is not made to a regular supplier whose account details you have on file, it is worth making that simple phone call to the business to verify their payment account details. Don't use the number on the invoice; go to the trouble of looking the number up and then call.

If you make regular large payments to suppliers and you receive an advice that the account details have changed then take a few minutes and make that phone call to verify the details directly with the supplier.

The ABC reports that Victorian farmers have lost hundreds of thousands to these types of scams. The first a victims knows of the scam is when the supplier contacts them to ask when the legitimate bill is to be paid.

Between January and September just this year, Australians have lost \$424.8 million dollars to scammers.

A simple phone call could save you thousands. Be scam aware and take care online.
