Bottles and Cans Roster – 2023-2024 Season

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RECYCLING

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. **However, we are no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.** Unfortunately, we are not able to recycle batteries.

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. *You could save a life!*





150 FACTS ABOUT STANSBURY: Facts 61-90 (2 x 15)

61. Poor year of attendance at the school in 1940 was due to outbreaks of measles, German measles, whooping cough and throat infections.
62. In 1941 the Australian Army, as a military exercise, demolished the original jetty by first exploding and then burning it.
63. A "Busy Bee" of parents at the School in 1942 dug a slit trench to accommodate the children in the event of an air raid. They were given help from the employees of the Butter Factory and the Cement Works.
64. A school bus commenced operating between Stansbury and Yorketown in 1943 enabling students to further their education at the Area School.
65. From 1945 to 1950 the Stansbury Cricket club won five premierships in succession. Bill Reynolds compiled a score of 180, which included a century of sixes,
66. In 1946 Stansbury broke the State rainfall record by registering 9 inches (228.6mm) in 24 hours.
67. A school bus run was opened between Stansbury and Minlaton in 1947. A converted military bus was first used with Mr A Butfield being the owner/driver. He continued for the following 30 years.
Steamers ceased trading between Stansbury and Port Adelaide in 1947.
Severe wind damage occurred to barley crops resulting in 50% loss to farmers in the district.
Adelaide Electricity Supply Co. took over the town's electricity in 1947 giving continual service. It was previously supplied on a part time basis by the local garage.
Council was granted permission in 1947 to layout a camping ground at the extreme end of the point with water being piped from the SAFU Butter Factory.
68. In 1950 Mr L Edwards became the first Caretaker of the Caravan Park at 3/- (30 cents) an hour.
In 1950 cricketer H Dodd captured all ten wickets in one innings as did his father George some years previously. That year Stansbury won its sixth successive premiership.
69. The Jubilee of Federation in 1951 was celebrated, in the form of a pageant, by the Stansbury School. The children all took some part depicting the landing of settlers at Stansbury.
A meeting attended by 23 interested people formed a Speedboat Club in 1951 and it commenced with 10 boats. It proved to be an integral part of the sporting and social scene from 1951 to 1971.
A Stansbury Men's A Grade Golf team remained undefeated in the 1951 season.
The Farmers Union Butter Factory closed down in 1951.
70. The football team under captain coach Jack Broadstock in 1952 had a winning margin for the season of 16 goals 2 behinds each match.
The gates at the recreation ground, built as a memorial to the men who lost their lives in World War II were opened in 1952.
The District Council of Yorketown built a fire station at Stansbury in Second (Towler) St.
Twelve men formed the Brigade in 1952 converting a 1937 Fargo truck.
The first annual Speedboat Regatta was held in 1952 when 10 local and 30 visiting boats competed in 9 races.

71. In 1953 a SYP Women's Basketball Association was formed with Stansbury winning the A grade premiership. It was this year that the third tennis court on the eastern side of the Recreation Ground was transferred to the basketball club and lights were erected on the rebuilt court.
72. Discussions re the building of a porch onto the Methodist Church were held as far back as 1928. It was not until 1955 that it was opened after extensive renovations were made to the building.
The Stansbury Bowling Club was formed in 1955. The District Council of Yorketown granted the club a portion of the parklands known as the Old Pound Site.
Erosion of Stansbury's beach was largely overcome by groynes installed by the Harbours Board in the mid 1950's
73. The Jetty Hotel was rebuilt in 1956 and renamed the Hotel Dalrymple.
It traded as Oyster Bay Hotel 1875 – 1879
 Jetty Hotel 1880 – 1955
 Hotel Dalrymple 1955 - 2023
The Croquet Club went into recess in 1956 and in 1960 closed with the bank balance donated to the newly formed Bowls Club.
74. In 1957 the Bowling Clubhouse and greens were formally opened by Mr Schroeder, General Manager of Adelaide Cement Company. The Company had volunteered assistance in the establishment of the area.
A club badge depicting the grain and fishing industries was designed for the Bowling Club by Mrs Vera Gill.
75. After 30 years of service Mr A Smith was transferred from the Post Office in 1958.
76. In 1959 reticulated water from the Murray River was connected to the township and district.
The school in 1959 had an enrolment of 59 students.
77. In 1960 a world standard hammer mill was installed at Klein Point. The jetty built in 1920 was extended in the 1960's to include a T-section, the main purpose the delivery of limestone to Port Adelaide.
The Speedboat Club reached a peak in the early 1960's when there were 17 local boats registered. At the annual Regatta in 1960 there were 12 local and 48 visiting boats competing in 17 races. During the Speedboat Club's existence spanning two decades, local members held Australian and State Titles – Max Koennecke in "Sinbad", Ron McWaters in "Hello Dere" and Graham South in "Linda".
A new brick Golf Clubhouse was opened in 1960 with hole numbers changed to suit the new starting point.
In 1960 groynes were placed in the bay and the road between Stansbury and Minlaton bitumenised.
78. In 1961 Stansbury entered a team in SYP Men's International Rules Basketball Association.
The Government tank sited diagonally across the corner of the school was sealed in 1961. A tap and stone were erected to mark the original site. It had been built as a watering point for animals and in times of drought for human consumption.
79. After approval was given to enter the planned scheme, in 1962 free distribution of milk at the school was introduced.

80. International Rules Basketball had become an extremely popular sport and a Stansbury Women's team was formed in 1964.
81. In 1965 Robert Farrow won the P&O Rural Youth trip of six months to the UK. An automatic telephone service was installed in 1965.
82. The Census of 1966 revealed that Stansbury's population was 401.
In 1966 the Golf clubhouse was extended and again in 1976 reflecting the growing membership.
In 1966 the present court complex was opened after a courts committee of representatives from the tennis and basketball clubs raised the money for their formation.
83. In the District Council of Yorketown in 1967 the township became Stansbury Ward and the remainder of the old ward became Weavers.
In 1967 Elanora, the Home for the Aged, was opened. It comprised a main block of ten single rooms with a large dining room and all facilities, another block of five motel rooms and a third section of four self contained cottages. The name "Elanora" is Aboriginal and means "home by the sea".
84. The school oval was officially opened in 1968 when a special sports day was held.
85. In 1969 the turfing of the Recreation Oval was completed.
86. Port Giles jetty and loading facilities were completed and in 1970 the official opening was performed by Mr Steele Hall, Premier of SA. The first shipment of grain was made from the silos.
Another wing consisting of ten additional single rooms with ensuite bathrooms, a large lounge and TV room were opened at Elanora in 1970.
The season 1970 -71 saw a new green of salt water couch planted at the bowling club. It was reputed to be one of the finest in the State. The garden area at the Bowling Club was extensively landscaped.
87. A passenger air service began in 1972 between Adelaide, Weavers and Kangaroo Island.
88. In July 1973 there was an increase of 1234 caravan nights in the park over the previous 12 months.
Stansbury township celebrated its Centenary in 1973. The Primary School children planted trees in what is now called Centenary Park.
A new residence was built in 1973 for the Principal of the School.
During 1973 there were A, B and C Grade men, A and B Grade women's teams in SYP International Rules Basketball.
Stansbury fielded teams in A and B Grade, colts and mini league in the football season of 1973.
89. A school uniform was approved and registered by the Education Department in 1974.
90. Stansbury Christian Church celebrated its centenary in 1975.
SYP Home for the Aged "Natt" wing was opened in 1975 providing an extra 12 ensuite rooms. Three motel units and a storeroom were built adjoining the existing units. The Pioneer Hall was built at the eastern end and was used as a general meeting place with a full size snooker table. It became the home of the Elanora Senior Citizens Club.
Membership of the bowling club was 45 men and 35 associates.

Where do you live now?

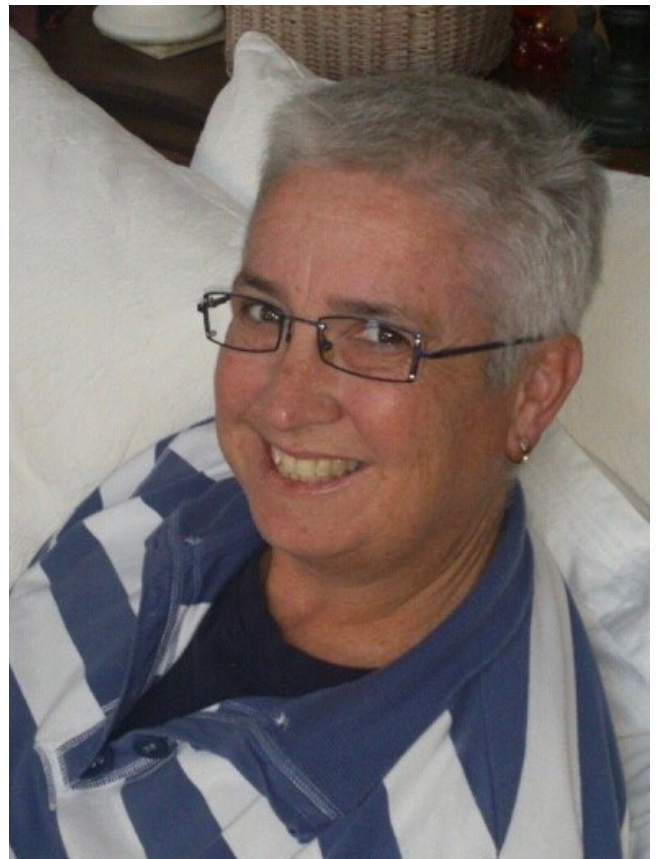

Its also yet another opportunity for scammers to try to convince you that the government is just waiting to shower you with riches if you just 'click on the link'



These type of scams have been around for a while but at budget and tax time they will surge as they prey on people who may be expecting a government windfall.

The scammers are hoping to harvest login credentials to facilitate identity takeover for fraudulent purposes.

The only messages the Government will send you will be in your secure MyGov mail box. Only access MyGov through your own internet search and NEVER share your login credentials with anybody. Once an identity thief has those login details they can make your life extremely difficult so protect them.

So if you receive a text from the ATO or the Government asking you to complete a form by clicking a link. Say all together now, " IT'S A SCAM!!!! "

If in doubt ring them on 1800 008 540 – Honestly the people on this help line are really very friendly and they'll soon tell you what's real and what's not.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

During the SA Festival in May the Stansbury Museum's theme posed the question

No Technology How Did it work ?

So many of the museums exhibits showcase how our predecessors were able to function and indeed thrive prior to the advent of electricity, computers, large scale manufacturing and modern materials. Some of the exhibits show an individual person's practical ingenuity create a tool to solve a problem in their own situation, often repurposing a readily available resource.

One of the first cabinets you can see in the museum displays sporting history and in it is a heavy, old wooden tennis racquet strung with gut (from the intestines of animals). You will notice that the wooden racquet has a wooden frame screwed over the head – this prevented the wood from bowing when not in use. Scientific technology has developed new materials which are lighter and more durable .Tennis racquets today are made from graphite, carbon fibre, Kevlar, aluminium or composite materials and are primarily strung with nylon or polyester.

Today if a manufacturer or even artisan or homemaker wants to label jams to sell it's an odds on bet that they will use a printer to either print directly on to or label their product and the boxes that they are packed in for distribution. In the 1890's Fruit Hill Jams were produced by J Cornish near Stansbury. Jams were packed in wooden boxes or crates and metal stencils painted over by hand were used to let customers know what product, how much and where it came from was in them. There are several examples of these stencils and one reads "Fruit Hill Jams Finest Apricot 48 2lb (tins or jars) J Cornish near Stansbury South Australia".

An example of newly developed materials changing for the same job is for sheep branding. Currently steel lettering brands are dipped in acrylic paint or for some marking sprayed from a pressure pack. Our museum has some examples of old hand crafted wooden sheep brands that were dipped in tar to brand the sheep.

There are many occasions in our day to day and business lives when we need accurate weights or measurements. These days there are all manner of digital electronic devices that do this with advanced technology. Our museum has examples of scales and balances used many years ago, right from those used by housewives in their kitchen to the large scale in the weighbridge used to weigh wheat bags that worked on the principle of counter balance? It is an interesting fact that the first historical evidence of counter balance scales being used was in Ancient Egypt in 2600BC.

In the large shed at the rear of the museum is an old measuring tool –a chain- link (sometimes known as a Gunter's chain link after it's inventor in England in 1620) that was used by farmers to position fence posts at regular intervals and also to accurately measure land. A chain is a measurement in the Imperial measurement system equivalent to 200 metres in the Metric system. The Metric system became the sole system of measurement in Australia in 1970. The chain-link measure had different markers to indicate distance, for example one link equalled 7.92 inches (200mm), 100 links equalled 1 chain (200 metres).Chain links were replaced in time by steel bands and tapes of a nickel –iron alloy which has a relative lack of contraction or expansion as temperature decreases or increases (invar) then EDM devices (electromagnetic distance measurement) and now by GPS(global positioning systems) devices..

With no fridges or freezers, there were clever ways of keeping food and drink cool. An ingenious reuse of a kerosene can was to cut out the sides and drape the cut out areas with wheat or sugar bags that were kept wet and hung where the breeze flowed, causing cooling by evaporation. It was a home made "Coolgardie Safe" reputedly so called because of their use in the goldfields of Coolgardie WA during the 1890's gold rush. Later canvas water bags attached to the bumper bars of early cars kept drinking water cool using the same principle. You can see examples of both in our museum.

Museum contd...

A hostess early last century wanting to keep her butter cool on the dining table could use a specially designed metal dish with an inner container of glass filled with cool water and the butter sat on a tray above this. Underground cellars were used to store and keep produce cool.

When electric blankets didn't exist, beds were warmed by wrapped bricks heated in the oven, stone ware bottles or metal containers filled with water, metal bed warmers filled with coals or rubber hot water bottles.

Where today we use electrical energy, our predecessors used manpower or animal power (horses, bullocks). Our predecessors used common sense, observation of the world around them and simple physics to solve problems and make their lives easier, for example, the hand operated drill press that used cogs, wheels and levers in the museums large display shed.

Today we are aided by access to an enormous volume of information and the speed of computers and machines to make our lives easier.....or is it more complex?
