RECYCLING

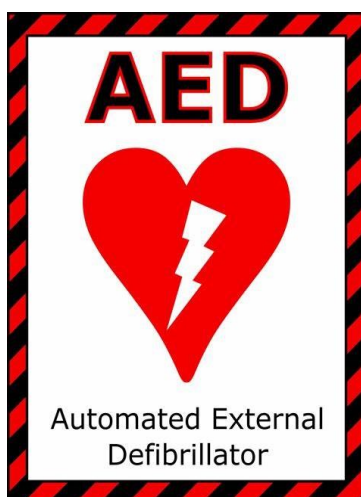
To help keep our town beautiful and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available: **Nespresso pods:** Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda. *No hypodermic needles please.*

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling has a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

The origin of this month's article came after I collected the Museum's mail and opened the latest edition of the Australian Plangon (Antique and Modern Doll Collectors) Club magazine. I admit I didn't know that a plangonologist was a doll collector. It set me on a journey of discovery and learning and thinking about the doll collection we have in our museum. It then led to me thinking about collections in general and how many collections we have in the Stansbury museum.

The origin of the word **Plangon** comes from Ancient Greece theatre where women were not allowed to perform so a wax doll (a plangon) was used to represent female characters and in Greek literature a doll was called a plaggon. Interestingly, I also discovered that in South Australia we have cuttlefish called sepia plangon. Sepia is group name for cuttlefish, named for the red brown pigment derived from cuttlefish ink and its description. Plangon seems to relate to the eyes which have a bluish tinge around them making them "doll like" or may relate to the way they can change shape and colour (plastic comes from the same root as plangon) but I digress.

The Stansbury museum has an impressive collection of dolls. They show case dolls made from a range of materials, different ways of dressing dolls, dolls representing different cultures, different sizes, dolls loved as treasured toys, dolls treasured as display items and even dolls used to tell stories to children. Also displayed are some teddy bears and so the museum could be described as an arctophile (teddy bear collector) as well. It truly is a great display and enjoyed by so many of the museum's visitors.

The room where the dolls are displayed is called the Collections Room and it also houses other significant collections – the shell collection (a shell collector is a choncologist), the camera and photographic accessories collection, the collection of office equipment like typewriters and gestetners, a buckle collection, a toy collection and a badge collection.

By its very nature, the museum is a collection of collections. A collection is a "gathering together" and the museum gathers together historical objects of interest. The way the museum is organised is to gather together items of similar nature or interest or items of a specific historical period in displays.

The large shed has collections of agricultural and fishing history. It has collections of rocks and gemstones, tools and more toys. There are collections relevant to kitchens and laundries plus many more. The smaller sheds also house collections including retail and grain and bottles. Collections do not stay static. They are added to and changed. As well as regular additions to the collections, displays are refreshed and reorganised.

The reading room (my favourite - given my love of words) houses books, magazines, short stories, newspapers, maps, historical records and postcards. It houses the collection devoted to remembering those who served in our armed services both in war and peace times. There is also a display relating to a past time that definitely relates to days gone by – cigarette and pipe smoking. On the walls are a collection of paintings of Stansbury done by an artist who lived in Stansbury.

Do consider revisiting the museum if you haven't visited for a while as I can guarantee that you are bound to find new and interesting exhibits. I am constantly amazed by the efforts of our many volunteers to tell the story of Stansbury and its surrounding areas. Even people who have been associated with the museum for many years say they are always discovering new items of interest. Come and have a look and if you have a passion for history, why not join us as a volunteer! Our volunteer team is a friendly and inclusive group and there are many different roles so you can choose what suits you best.

Just for fun - did you know? A deltiologist is a post card collector (from the Greek origin "deltion" meaning a small illustrated tablet or card) and a beer mat or coaster collector is a tegestologist (from the Latin "teges" meaning mat or covering)

COMMUNITY NOTICE REGARDING FISHING OF BLUE CRABS

THE INFORMATION BELOW HAS BEEN PROVIDED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PRIMARY INDUSTRIES AND REGIONS, JANUARY 2024, IN REPOSE TO SPECIFIC QUESTIONS WHICH WERE SUBMITTED TO THE DEPARTMENT.

1. How many commercial licences have been issued for fishing in Gulf St Vincent and Spencer Gulf? What are the quotas?

There are 10 licences in the commercial Blue Crab Fishery (BCF). The BCF is a pot fishery that targets Blue Crab and is constrained to the waters of the Blue Crab Fishing Zone within the Spencer Gulf and Gulf St Vincent. Eight (8) licence holders have reported catches in 2022/23. The Total Allowable Commercial Catch (TACC) for Blue Crab in BCF in 2023/24 is:

458 tonnes in the Spencer Gulf Blue Crab Fishing Zone
245.15 tonnes in the Gulf St Vincent Blue Crab Fishing Zone.

2. How close can the commercial boats come into shore? ie. What is the distance they need to stay away from shore?

There is no year round regulated restriction preventing commercial crab nets from being set near the shore, however BCF licence holders generally fish in waters deeper than those fished by recreational fishers.

There are currently several spatial/temporal closures in place in the BCF as outlined in the map in Appendix A and further specified in the Management Plan for the South Australian Commercial Blue Crab Fisher (BCF Management Plan), available at:

The arrangements assist to reduce commercial activity in specific areas during peak recreational fishing periods.

3. Confirmation that the closure dates for commercial fishing are 1st December to Easter Monday? ie No commercial boats to be fishing in the gulf during this period.

As outlined in the map in Appendix A, there is a commercial BCF closure in the areas marked yellow from 1 December to Easter Monday (inclusive) each year.

4. Are any surveys or management processes currently in place to assess crab numbers etc to ensure they will not be “fished out”?

All Blue Crab stocks in South Australia are classified as “sustainable”.

Commercial fishery

All catches of Blue Crab in the BCF are reported to PIRSA through catch and effort logbooks. The commercial BCF is annually assessed by the South Australian Research and Development Institute (SARDI). This assessment incorporates results from fishery independent surveys (FIS) undertaken in March/April each year. These surveys provide an independent estimate of relative biomass for the Blue Crab stocks in each of the Gulfs. The latest assessment of the BCF is available on the SARDI website.

The results of the annual FIS inform the setting of the total allowable commercial catch of Blue Crab in each Gulf according to arrangements outlined in the harvest strategy for the fishery.

Recreational fishery

Recreational catches of Blue Crab are estimated through periodic surveys. The South Australian Recreational Fishing Survey 2021-22 report was released 22 February 2023 providing valuable insight into South Australia’s important recreational fishery. This report is available on the PIRSA website.

Based on retained weight, Blue Crab was the second most important species for recreational fishers across the State, with 251 tonnes retained. This information is incorporated into the annual assessments undertaken by SARDI.

5. Any other information that would be useful to provide the community in regard to this matter.

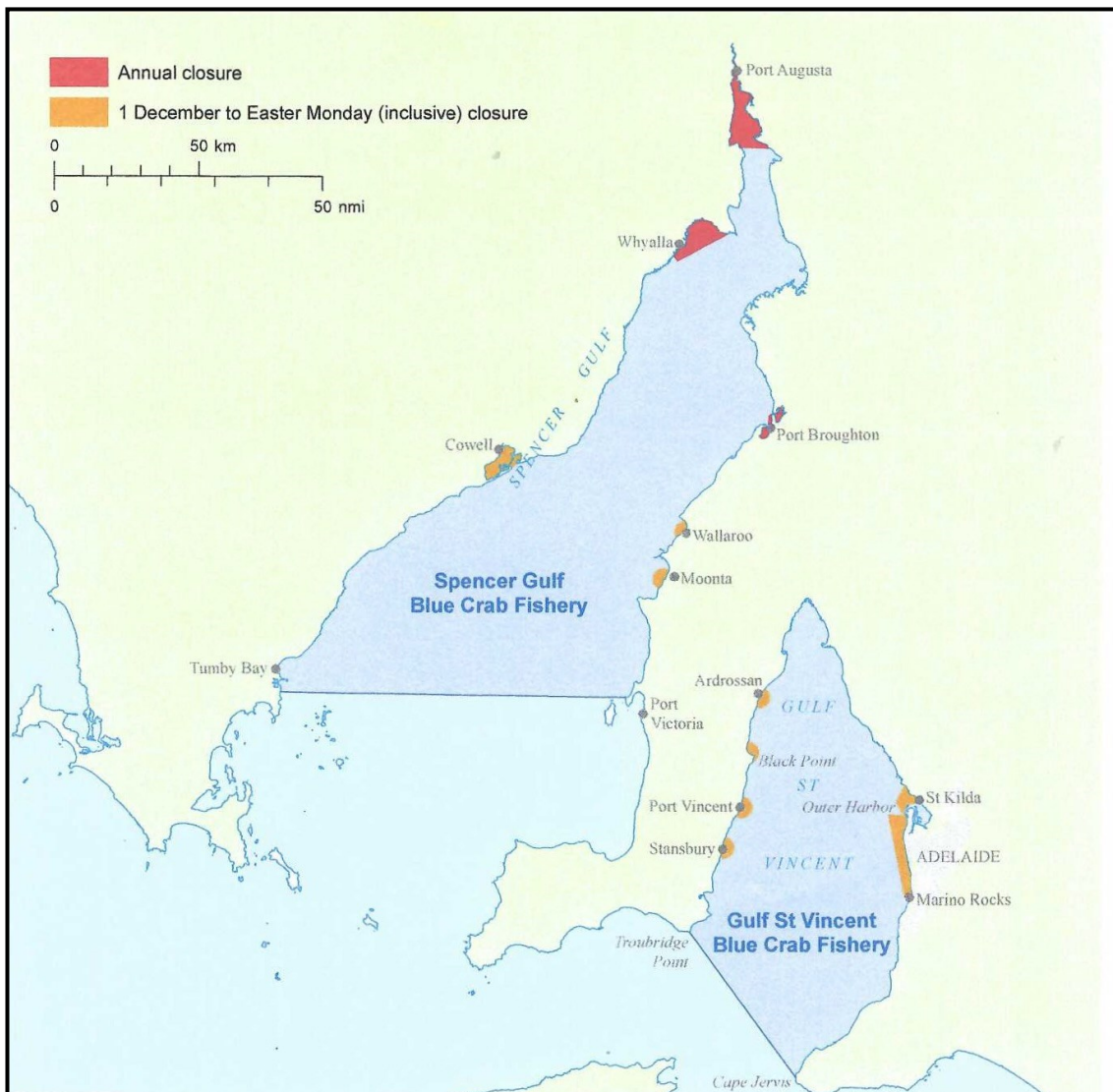
Formal allocations/catch shares of the Blue Crab resource are provided for under the BCF Management Plan and Management Plan for Recreational Fishing in South Australia. Under these plans, 65.5% of the Blue Crab resource is allocated to the commercial BCF, and 29% is allocated to the recreational sector.

Following the release of the Recreational Fishing Survey report in 2023, catches from the commercial and recreational sectors were evaluated against the allocations. This indicated that the retained recreational catch was 29% of the total harvest of Blue Crab, indicating the allocations are being adhered to and remain appropriate. Notwithstanding the above information, a replacement draft Management Plan for the South Australian Commercial Blue Crab Fishery has been prepared and is currently open for public comment until 3 March 2024. Further information about this consultation is available.
