RECYCLING

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. **However, we are no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.** Unfortunately, we are not able to recycle batteries.

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. *You could save a life!*





150 FACTS ABOUT STANSBURY: Facts 46—60

46. A quote from the publication, *Souvenir of Yorke Peninsula* dated 1921 "Stansbury has the qualities for progress and prosperity. It has a fine jetty, which accommodates gulf steamers and other coastal craft. The beach is spacious and attractive alike to residents and visitors. It is a stereotyped compliment to say that a place has gone ahead by leaps and bounds, but that is unquestionably true of Stansbury" and later in the article "it has the distinction of having two jetties – one belonging to the Government and the other under the control of the District Council."
The Progress Association went into recess until 1921 due to World War I and then from 1922 – 28 when it was reformed and known as the Improvement Committee.
In the early 1920's a busy and prosperous salt factory was operated from a building on the corner of Weaver and Towler Sts. It was managed by a Mr McLean and there was a rail track to the jetty for carting the salt.
A major fire in a business in Towler St in 1921 resulted in a grain store burning down leaving the shop intact. Over many years the front rooms were used as a general store, confectionary shop and a fish and ice-works, but is now a private residence.
47. In 1922 the Soldiers Memorial Hall was added to the Institute. A moreton bay fig tree which had been planted in 1910 had to be relocated to the foreshore where it still exists today.
The Weavers Agricultural Bureau was formed in 1922 with Mr A Piggott as Chairman and Mr L Slade the secretary. By 1924 meetings were held alternately at Weavers and Stansbury.
48. In 1923 cricketer George Agnew took 6/22 to begin a great career with the club. He retired in 1953 with a total of 726 wickets to his name, a record still held today.
The Stansbury Butter Factory was built and commenced operating in 1923. At its peak 2,400 pounds of butter was produced weekly.
A bakery on the corner of Weaver and St. Vincent Sts. was sold to Wally Peterson in 1923 and continued as a family-owned business until the building was sold in 1973.
49. In 1923/24 two new lime ash based tennis courts were laid by Mr B Rattley.
The Supper room at the Institute was built by Mr G Hepenstall at a cost of £373 in 1924.
In 1924 a decision was made to build a golf course in the Parklands.
Mr A Bowman supervised the planting of the Norfolk Island Pines in what is now known as Weaver Street. Buckets of water were carried from the Post Office tank until they were established.
50. The Harbour's Board purchased a house in 1925 for the first Harbour Master, Mr Herapath. One of his duties was to care for the draught horses that hauled the loaded trucks along the jetty to the ketches.
51. In 1926 two new rooms were opened at the school. 90 children were registered and accommodation proved to be a problem.
52. A complete new plant was installed at Kleins Point in 1927.
53. In 1929 telephone services were extended to farming areas.
Electricity supplied to township by local garage.
The Stansbury Croquet Club was formed in 1929 with a membership of 19.

54. An extension known as the Kindergarten Room was opened at the Methodist Church in 1930 at a cost of £220.
After two weather board cottages were demolished in 1930 a new garage and power-house were constructed in Weaver St. After a fire in 1947 the current building with five separate shops was built. A variety of businesses have leased these premises and today they house the post office, two real estate agencies, police station and hairdresser.
55. A Grade V111 class was introduced at the school in 1931 because of limited opportunities for further education.
In 1931 the Progress Committee was formed by the amalgamation of the Improvement and the Vigilance Committees.
56. The first Stansbury Flower Show was held in 1932. The show continued to function during the war years. Although no prizes were given the profits were donated to war efforts. The last show was held in 1953 and the remaining assets were distributed to various bodies in the town.
57. Bill Reynolds began playing cricket in 1933 and when he retired in 1960 he had amassed a total of 6703 runs which included 15 centuries and a highest score of 249.
Stansbury and Minlaton Football teams drew the Grand Final in 1933, but in the replay Minlaton were comfortable winners. In this same year Les Dry won the Association fairest and best player award.
Records of the Methodist Sunday School in 1933 showed an enrolment of 103 with 13 teachers in attendance.
58. In 1934 a Mothers Welfare Club was formed at the school.
59. Don Jolly was the greatest goalkicker the football club ever produced and held the Association record in 1936 kicking 119 goals.
Football premierships were won in 1936, 1937, 1938 and 1940 and then the competition was postponed for the duration of the second World War.
60. In 1937 Herbert Anderson began playing cricket and continued until 1959 in which time he scored 6057 runs including 15 centuries and a top score of 159.
The earliest records of a women's basketball club are dated 1937 when matches were played of Saturday afternoons and Stansbury fielded A and B grade teams.

THE MUSEUM'S STANSBURY 150 PROJECT

Some of you may already be aware that two Stansbury Cemetery Directory Signs to be unveiled on Sunday, 1st October at the Cemetery entrance are the Stansbury Museum's contribution to the Stansbury 150 celebrations.

The cemetery is the final resting place for many people from pioneering families to more recent arrivals. The Grave Directory Signs will be an invaluable resource for present and future generations (including the local school children who diligently and respectfully place flags on the graves of Service people on ANZAC and Remembrance Days) and those researching family histories with the Museum regularly receiving requests for information from all round Australia and even overseas.

Stansbury has a proud history of remembering and reflecting on its past. The new cemetery signs will hopefully encourage even more people to reflect on this and play their part in creating what will in the future be the history of the next decades.

The Museum's project will be partly funded by donations from the Stansbury Dalrymple Lions Club and the Stansbury RSL subbranch. This is less than half of what is required to fund the project. Some private donations have also been received or promised and more would be appreciated. We expect that the Grave Directory Signs will enhance the overall aesthetics of the Cemetery as well as providing information to improve access to grave locations.

An expert in salt damp said the laying of the new pavers has caused the damage, as the wall has been treated.

Council's insurance company has denied responsibility.
