Yorke Peninsula Strategic Management Plan Review – Community Feedback.

The Yorke Peninsula Council has recently commenced a review of their 2021-2025 Strategic Management Plan. This Plan is now nearing the end of its timeframe and it is important that it is reviewed and updated to reflect the expectations of the community, and provide guidance for growth and prosperity.

The Council has engaged Town Planning consultancy Holmes Dyer to undertake the review and prepare an updated Strategic Plan.

As part of this process, a survey is available to the residents and landowners, business people, students, visitors, etc of the Yorke Peninsula Council district to have their voice heard.

Members of the RSL observed Vietnam Veterans' Day on Sunday 18th of August by laying a wreath at the Cenotaph. On that day in 1966 105 men of D Company 6Bn RAR held a position against massively greater odds in the Long Tan Rubber plantation in Pho'u'c Tuy Province in South Vietnam. D Company lost over one third of its strength and eighteen brave young Australians died.

The Sub-Branch is currently preparing for Remembrance Day on 11 November. This will include the students from the Primary School placing flags on the graves of returned servicemen in the cemetery which has been part of ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day commemorations in Stansbury since 2012.

The Sub-Branch meets in the Soldiers' Memorial Institute on the second Thursday of each month. Ex-Service personnel and others are welcome to attend.



<u>RECYCLING</u>

To help keep our town beautiful and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available: **Nespresso pods**: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

No hypodermic needles please.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the <u>collection cages located around</u> <u>the town</u>, or the <u>blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks</u>. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling has a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

Yellow Bin

As a reminder of what to put in the yellow kerb side recycling bin, we now have large fridge magnets from Green Industries. Pick up your free magnet from the Visitor Centre weekdays 9.30am-4pm.

Blister Packs

Empty blister packs can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre in our designated box. Blister packs only, no plastic bags or cardboard.


Talking of quilts, our application for a council grant for wadding, has been successful! Better get busy quilters!

STANSBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL TERM 3 NEWS

During the term there have been several activities including Bookweek assembly, hosting leaders from across the Peninsula and our Open Morning. Each event has given us the privilege of show casing the learning that happens at SPS. We had so many positive comments from the wider community with the main thread being that SPS has such a welcoming and beautiful environment for the children to learn in. We are proud of the authentic learning opportunities we provide for our children, including exploring the space across the road from the school in the hope of revegetating it. We have also been dehydrating oranges and dipping them in chocolate for Father's Day gifts and creating our own water tower designs, all linking back to the curriculum.

At Stansbury Primary we not only focus on the content of the curriculum but on the dispositions, we need to learn. Students can articulate how they work their way out of the learning pit, the importance of "having a go" and "that it is ok to make mistakes". With these skills and dispositions in their tool kit, we have seen children move from passive learners to empowered learners, which in turn has resulted in an improved attitude towards their learning, high wellbeing, resilience and success.



Another highlight for term 3 was when we finally received our 12-seater bus that we ordered last year. The children were extremely excited when we ventured out on our excursion to the Port Vincent water tower and then on to Minlaton DS for a performance. The children have named it Harry. We will be using the bus for excursions, to collaborate with other schools and to support our families who travel a distance. The bus currently does one day a week towards Edithburgh. Look out for us on the road, especially when we get our new signage!!

We welcomed two new families to our playcentre this term. Playcentre is run every Monday morning– and a warm welcome is extended to all those with young children (0-5) to join us.

Next term we welcome our two new 2025 reception children Isla and Cody for their transition visits. They will be joined halfway through next year by Alice, Benji and Freya, we can't wait for them to join us.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

At our recent AGM, the museum Chairperson, Carrol Roberts delivered the yearly report and detailed the many achievements of the past year. The successful and memorable Stansbury 150th celebrations and the museum's many and varied contributions to this event were a highlight. After the sad passing of our Secretary, Susan in January who had played a leading role in documenting and curating exhibits in museum, our whole committee stepped up and contributed to ensuring it was business as usual at the museum and in doing so learned new skills and ways to pitch in and help. Volunteering in any organisation has so many benefits, both to the organisation and their cause but also to the individual volunteers personally. The museum welcomed new volunteers this year and everyone has brought new enthusiasm and ideas. We are delighted to have a new member join our committee this year. There are many different ways a volunteer can contribute at the museum and we're always happy to add more to our team. **Our market stall at the seaside markets, in particular, would welcome anyone who can spare a couple of hours on market days but especially volunteers to serve the food (no cooking required) and available after 9am. Please contact Lee on 0438 138 907 if you can help.**

One of the museum's latest projects has sparked my interest in the origin of a building material so common in Australia and especially in rural areas. CoRrUgAtEd iron was once described as "the building material which made the bush". Although it was used in many other countries throughout the world, no other country seems to have embraced it like Australia. Interestingly, the patent for "indented or corrugated metallic sheets" was taken out by Henry Palmer of the London Dock company in 1829 in the UK. Henry Palmer was an engineer and architect. He built a large storage warehouse at the docks that was entirely roofed with self supporting corrugated iron sheets. It was a revolutionary roof of its time. The corrugations (alternating grooves and ridges) helped to make the roof stiffer and thus stronger over a greater distance than previously used materials.

Since about 1850 corrugated, galvanised iron and steel have been used in Australia for a multitude of uses limited only by Aussie's imaginations. Its advantage over traditional materials, particularly in Australia with its great distances is that it is relatively light and easy to stack and transport. It is also weather resistant. It is a classic building material used for roofing, outer walls, interior walls, fences and even water tanks. Just think of some of the beautiful, old shearing sheds. Some were built with walls of locally sourced stone with corrugated iron roofs and others are built entirely of corrugated iron. If we look around us today, we see that it remains a widely used building and garden material. It is used in modern interior design, often using finer corrugations than used in outdoor applications. Corrugated iron is even used in modern day sculptures and art work. Cast your eyes around Stansbury and marvel in the versatility of corrugated iron. I wonder if Henry Palmer had any idea what an impact his "wrinkly tin' as it is sometimes known in the UK, would have?

A classic, Australian architectural use of corrugated iron is the bull nose verandah. A bull nose verandah is described as "a porch or walkway that protrudes from the main structure of a building. It is usually semi-circular or half cylindrical in shape and is supported by columns". The style became popular during the Victorian and Edwardian periods (mid 1850's -1920's). The new addition to the museum's implement shed is a bull nose verandah. This verandah was donated and was originally on a local building. After it was removed and dismantled, it was painstakingly re-erected and painted by our enthusiastic volunteers who are justifiably very proud of their accomplishment. It is the centrepiece of the ongoing rejuvenation of the area of the museum between the rear of the main building and the big shed. This is a work in progress. As the work has progressed, lots of presentation ideas have been generated, including adding a paved area under the bullnose verandah to make it more visitor friendly. We have been recently delighted to have the donation of a significant number of pavers – yet another way our generous Stansbury community supports their museum.

As our Chairperson said in this years AGM report "the Museum is a real town asset and a great experience for locals and visitors".

STANSBURY CFS - NEEDS YOUR HELP!!



Stansbury CFS has been active in the Stansbury community for more than 70 years (1952), but we desperately need new members. I'm scared that if numbers continue to fall and we are unable to respond – the Government might close the brigade.

This is your service, it is people in our community – serving our community, if you don't do it, there is no one else. For example – there is one paid paramedic on the YP

If there is chance that you, your family members, or significant others in your life, may need emergency services in the future and you don't want them suffering unnecessarily, please consider joining the CFS.

In keeping with the rhythms of life - we have had a few resignations (health related and moving away from the area) and along with new ways of working – several of our members are now away from Stansbury for extended periods with work contracts. This means that Stansbury CFS is critically low on Members (particularly drivers – HR). We are at real risk of not being able to respond to emergencies and if this happens too many times – we risk losing our brigade.

Being regional and remote – the CFS is often the first responder to any number of emergency incidents in our region. Along with our traditional role in wildfires, CFS also is responsible for structure fires (house and industrial fires – *e.g.* Klein Point Quarry and Silos at Port Giles) and is often the first arriving service at Road Crash Incidents – (assist SAPOL).

Other emergency incidents (such as Hazardous material, chemical spills, floods, trees down, powerlines down), and increasingly we aid the South Australian Ambulance Service (SAAS), both for patient lifts, drive ambulance and now medical incidents as traditional agencies are stretched further and further.

We need between 20 and 25 active members, to spread the load and to ensure that we can get a crew to any call out.

The commitment of time is not onerous. No one expects you to put your life on hold, if you have had a few drinks, or are throwing a surprise party for someone, or are at work and cannot reasonably get away, don't turn up to a call out – we understand.

You don't have to show up to every training session (it's nice if you do). To remain active, you must attend and complete an annual "Skills Maintenance Drill" (demonstrate your physical ability to get in and out of the truck - and awareness of your own safety) and turn up to training (which is often just a catch up and a drink) say 4 times per year.

Age or Gender should not deter you from making a contribution. Our current membership includes 2 females. Our oldest active member is around 75 and our youngest is 30.
