RECYCLING

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the <u>collection cages located</u> <u>around the town</u>, or the <u>blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks</u>. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. **However, we are no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.** Unfortunately, we are not able to recycle batteries.

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. You could save a life!

150 FACTS ABOUT STANSBURY: Facts 136 - 150 (1x15)

- The Netball Club went into recess in 2019 having been formed in 1953. "Elanora" the SYP Home for the Aged facility was closed permanently in 2019.
- 137 The Coronavirus pandemic changed our lives and many activities were cancelled in 2020.
- 138 "Elanora" was sold Meals On Wheels distribution centre was changed to the Visitor Centre. Senior Citizens Club was relocated to the Sports and Community Club and the RSL are using a room at the Institute.
- The Stansbury Senior Citizens Club in 2021 had a name change, 46 years after the original committee was formed.

 Ron Duncan was awarded an OAM for his services to the community.
- 140 In 2021 an Isuzu FTS800 unit costing \$350,000 was delivered to the Stansbury CFS.
- 141 Up until 2021 the Bowling Club had won 26 men's pennants, over all divisions, the Champion of Champions singles 11 times and the men's pairs 3 times. The women have won 3 pennants and the Champion of Champions singles 3 times.
- The 2021 census listed the population of Stansbury at 603 with a median age of 61 years.
- 143 The Ladies 1st Division Bowls team won the SYP Premiership in 2022, the first one since the 1965-66 season.
- 144. In 2023 the Cricket Club held a 20 year reunion with the timing coinciding with the winning of the premiership in 2003-04, the first at that time for 54 years.
- 145. Stansbury is 207 kms from Adelaide an easy two hour drive. It is located on the southern east coast of Yorke Peninsula in South Australia overlooking Gulf St Vincent.
- It is a great place to explore, eat and relax offering the perfect holiday destination. The calm waters of the bay are ideal for swimming, water skiing and windsurfing.
- 147 Seaside Markets, Water Tower and Murals, Coastal Walks, Museum, Parks and Lookouts are tourist attractions in the town.
- Stansbury enjoys a Mediterranean climate with cool sea breezes that moderate the summer heat with temperatures between 15 30 degrees C. In winter cool temperatures average between 7 16 degrees C.
- 149 It is centrally located for access to Dhilba Guuranda-Innes National Park to the south and the Copper Coast to the north.
- 150 The postcode for Stansbury is 5582.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

A good, vibrant museum collection is not static. It is continually evolving and having new exhibits added and old exhibits revamped or re-imagined. Changes in technology and society also allow the museum to grow and change. The Stansbury Museum is no different and its committee, aided by other volunteers, works hard to ensure that this happens.

Here Now! Something new that enhances an existing exhibit!

It is the soap box racer made and raced by the Mason family in the 1980's.

They were one of the 4 Stansbury families who were inspired to enter vehicles in the Australia Day long weekend 1980 on Towler St as an initiative of Lions Club of Yorketown. They later transferred management of the event to the Stansbury CFS.

This is a great new addition to the Soap Box Racing display as it is a completely different style to the other main signature piece, Rusty's Racer. Rusty's Racer was sleekly fashioned from the bonnet of Rusty martin's 1955 Holden ute and painted bright yellow. It was made by Bob Jung and was raced by his children. It won several Derbies.

The Mason family racer is a billy cart style, the body is crafted primarily from wood and stained and decorated with stickers. Some winner's plaques from trophies were obviously proudly added over its racing life. It has an upholstered blue seat with red headrest. Right at the front you can clearly see the special fitting that was built into the cart to allow a tow rope to be attached. After the race, the drivers remained in their carts and were towed 6 at a time back up the hill. You can also see that soap box racing wasn't a male only sport as Fiona Mason won and placed in many events. The Soap Box Derby's had different classes (up to 6 over the years) and this allowed children from 5 years to 16 to participate plus a Seniors Class so it was fun for the whole family

Both are classic examples of soap box racers that were launched from a ramp at the top of the hill and hurtled to the bottom of the hill where, if their rudimentary brakes didn't stop them, the judiciously placed hay bales did. They were steered by a simple lever and the brakes were usually a piece of old tyre attached to a T shaped leg that descended from underneath the racer. Simple but effective although oversteering could cause the car to flip over sideways and brakes could fail!

Many Stansbury locals had a run down this hill. I have it on good authority from a mature local lady that it was a huge adrenalin rush and seemed all the faster because you were so low to the ground. Apparently these soap box racers could get up to 60 km per hour. Thank goodness participants were safety helmets!

As well as being fun family events, the 10 years that the Soap Box Associations Derbies were held in Stansbury allowed many local organisations like the Lions Club, CFS and the Museum to benefit from fundraising during the events.

Coming Soon! What's on the horizon?

The men's team of the museum has a very exciting and impressive project underway that they hope and aim to have on display for the Stansbury 150th. This endeavour will be the result of collaboration with local donors who are descendants of original and early settlers, many dedicated volunteers and some local tradesmen/builders. It will be eye catching and a real statement piece that will greet people as they travel down the hill into Stansbury. At over 100 years old, it boldly represents local farming history.

Hint, it is a very old technology that uses a widely available resource to produce rotational energy to make available another resource. Watch this space and the Museum front yard in coming weeks!

STANSBURY MUSEUM ANNUAL REPORT 2022-2023

This year has been busy and varied with preparations for the town' 150 celebrations planned for the October long weekend. Our main project has been the research (ongoing for many years) and plans for two directory signs to be erected at the cemetery to list all those interred there. The Historic Walk Booklet has been rewritten and updated. Our volunteers have spent hours searching our archives for photos and information requested by various town groups. Thankfully we had received Reg Bowmans' slides, which records many town events and these along with many others, will be included in the Light Show on the cliff face. Margaret Farrow has sourced sporting and various clubs, for their Minute Books for information for the Addendum Book. These Minute Books are now in the museum archives and will be great references in the future.

Authority was given for the treasurer to do on-line banking but cheques still require 2 signatures and the Internet plan was updated. With a grant, plus added funds, from Progress and museum, all the lights inside and out were changed to LED. This has added more light and will help in preserving the displays. During the year we have purchased a new printer, paper shredder, fire alarms and door bells. New T shirts were supplied to all the committee members and roster volunteers. Our new Centrelink Worker, Greg has been busy repairing and painting the outside sheds, painting the main building timber work, general maintenance and gardening. He is knowledgeable in a variety of handyman skills and also helps at the markets.

Due to heavy rains during the year there was flooding in the main shed resulting in minor damage, mainly to the bases of display cupboards, these have been repaired and raised. On inspection the main problem was from the box gutter and splits in the fibreglass roof sheeting, and these have been replaced. The rain also caused a short in the electrical wiring to the Men's shed and this has also been rectified.

The Seaside markets remain our main fundraising event but due to increased prices it was necessary to change our supplier and this allowed us to not increase the selling price. The electronic banking has proved very popular with customers. Other funds were raised from the can and bottle collection (thanks to Gary and Luke), hiring trestles, badges for Adelaide Hills Motor Restorers Club, catering for the Anzac Day breakfast, raffle, entry fees and donations.

Sadly during the year two of our former committee members passed away, Keith Brown, who had moved to Meadows and Bob Jung. Even though Bob had resigned from the committee he was still a very active and committed part of the team. Due to his ill health he continued to do things but in his own time. His last task was to put the glass over the institute cupboard, the Army travelling cobblers' box (which holds the Meccano display) also the incubators. He had been a big part of the museum since it began and much of his handy work is evident all over the museum. Numerous articles on displays are from the Jung family. Working at the Seaside Markets was one of his favourite past times.

The museum continues to receive donations of articles. We are happy to accept them even with limited space in the buildings. This year those donations included a windmill, which after restoration, will be our new display in the front garden area. There are also old gates, town signs, Go Karts plus numerous other articles. Any newly added information of local stories or articles will be kept for future generations.

Thank you to the Committee Members and all those who volunteer in many different ways and for the continued support of the Yorke Peninsula Council, Stansbury Progress Association and Tidy Towns Group.

The Museum is a real asset to the town and a great experience for locals and visitors.

NEW FEES FROM THE 1ST OF SEPTEMBER 2023

Due to the Albanese governments implementation of 60 day dispensing there will be a 40% loss of funding to our pharmacy. Unfortunately, this means Stansbury Pharmacy will have to start charging for services we once did for free or a small cost. These fees will not recoup the losses but help keep the Pharmacy operational and retain staff.

Dosage Administration Aids	Free or small cost	\$25 start-up fee (one off). \$5 per week for Community patients that remain on 30-day dispensing. \$10 per week for Community patients wishing to use 60 day dispense. \$7.50 per week for Nursing Home resi- dents (non-subsidised).
Home Delivery	Free	\$7.50 per local delivery.
Sick Certificates	\$15 per certificate	\$25 per certificate.
Signing of Documents and/or Printing	Free	\$5 per document.
Owing prescriptions	Free	\$5 admin fee on top of script price.
Watch Battery replacement	Free	\$7.50 plus cost of battery.
Interprofessional consultations	Free	We will have to charge for time spent talking to Dr's, Specialists, Nurses, Hospital Pharmacists, Surgery Reception staff, Allied Health Professionals, etc. \$10 per 6 minutes.
Wound care and dressings	Cost of items used	\$15 service charge in addition to cost of items used.

Other follow-on effects of this ill-thought-out government policy include:

- Sponsorship and donations. For the last 14 years we have provided over \$5,000 per year supporting charities, local groups/organisations, and sporting clubs. Unfortunately, this will have to cease until a new PBS reform one day in the future hopefully.
- Opening hours and staffing. While we will try to maintain our current staffing and service there will be some changes in the future to help reduce costs.
- We will only open on Saturday mornings for markets.
 There may be the occasional day we are closed when George has an appointment, personal or family commitment or sick day for example. Where possible we will try to give advanced notice of course.
- When locums are working our hours may be reduced (9am to 2pm) each day, otherwise we would be running at a loss.

We are still hopeful that an 8th Pharmacy Agreement with the Government will rectify some of the funding for these services and the Pharmacy sector in general. But we will not know until this time comes as to when our customers, and most vulnerable of the community, will cease this extra financial burden.
