RECYCLING:

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used *Nespresso* pods only can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full please leave the paper bundles under the verandah.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are *clean and appropriately packed*. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the <u>collection cages located</u> <u>around the town</u>, or the <u>blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks</u>. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. However, we are *no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.*

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. You could save a life!


We enjoyed a visit from the Warooka craft girls during March too, as we shared our projects together.


My Story, and Gardening Gurus continue to bring interest to our group.



With the increasingly commonplace use of electronic devices to access and conduct our financial activities, scammers have turned their wiles



to devising methods to access the financial information stored within our devices. Online banking is now so common that we don't turn a hair at using our mobile phone or computer to conduct our financial affairs and access our accounts. Often with the demands of remembering the thousand or so passcodes/words that we seem to need for our normal online activates we take the easy way out and allow our phones and devices to store and retrieve our passwords for us.

This means that your devices are now the very lucrative keys to accessing your finances. In 2021 South Australians lost in excess of \$4.2 million dollars in remote access scams. So what is a remote access scam?

A scammer will contact a target by phone, email or even an online pop up chat claiming to be from a reputable known company or institution. It may be Telstra about your NBN service, Microsoft offering to install a virus update or new security, Amazon or Paypal advising your account has been frozen. It could even be your own bank, Superannuation Fund or the Tax Office supposedly calling to let you know about a suspect transaction on your account. The story will be plausible and reasonable but what comes next is far from reasonable. Instead of the promised assistance it will be an app which will allow them to remotely access your device and your accounts. Legitimate business applications such as Anydesk, Teamviewer, Zoho assist, Quik Support can easily be used by scammers to access your account.

If they manage to install a remote access app then they won't even bother asking for your PIN. They already have the means to lock you out of your account while they drain it!

So here are some RED FLAGS to be aware of that may indicate that the very helpful voice on the other end of the phone is actually a heartless scammer.

They are very persistent in getting you to agree to let them access your device.

They may even become angry and aggressive if you won't do what they are telling you to do. They may even threaten you with losing all your money, closure of your account or even being arrested.

They may (not always) demand the PIN or password to your accounts.

They demand personal information or photographs of documents to verify your identity. They demand large payments to 'fix' the problem or insist you buy gift cards. (Rest as-

sured the Tax department will never accept payment in iTunes cards) If you are at all suspicious then hang up immediately.

If you think your account may have been compromised contact your bank or financial institution immediately.

If you're just not sure whether it might be legitimate then hang up and ring the relevant company yourself. Don't hit redial to dial the scammer back. Look up the number yourself. Protect Yourself!

NEVER allow anyone to remotely access your computer/phone/tablet.

NEVER give your Account information or your PIN or Password to ANYBODY no matter what.

NEVER give personal details to someone who has rung you without warning.

NEVER send copies of your personal identification documents to unsolicited callers. NEVER give an unknown caller your credit card details

- NEVER allow anyone to remotely access your computer/phone/tablet (yes I repeated myself because this point is important.)
- DO install anti-virus software that you have purchased yourself from a reputable vendor that you can trust.

STANSBURY MUSEUM

Continuing on last months theme of 11 year old Dean Agnew's diary written in 1942/43, I need to set the scene.1942 is often referred to as "the year that the war came to Australia". Darwin was first attacked by Japan on 19th February 1942 and Broome was attacked 2 weeks later. In May 1942 midget submarines entered Sydney Harbour and by June submarines had bombarded the ports of Sydney and Newcastle.

After Japan's entry into the war, training aircraft were formed into reserve squadrons to protect the South Australian coast. A ring of airfields were organised for the defence of Adelaide (Gawler, Mallala, Mount Gambier, Victor Harbor and Parafield).

Dean recounts in several of his diary entries sighting planes from the Mallala RAAF base. They were from the No 6 Service Training School. On Friday 6th June 1943 Dean wrote "This morning about 9 o'clock 6 aeroplanes flew over about 100' up. Richie said he got under a tree because it was only 2 yards above his head. Sammy said that he grabbed hold of a wing." He also recalls his father being on the Caterpillar tractor in the paddock and having "the daylights scared out of him" when an aeroplane skimmed over the top of him. He hadn't heard it until it was directly overhead. Dean also remembers horses bolting when startled by the aircraft. Dean's memory is that the vegetation along the coast road close to Stansbury was much shorter and less dense due to a nearby farmer grazing his sheep right up to the edge of the road and consequently seeing an aircraft suddenly appearing up over the cliff and hedgehopping across the paddocks was quite spectacular.

By October and November, Dean mentions specific aircraft types. "Yesterday a Wirraway fighter flew over" The Wirraway was a training and general purpose military aircraft. On 8th November 1943 his entry was accompanied by a drawing of the plane. "Yesterday a Avro Anson circled around Stansbury 5 times". The Avro Anson was a British twin engine multi role aircraft that was manufactured in Australia during WW2.

The majority of the male population were away doing military service with the exception of farmers who were exempted because they provided an essential service. Sadly Dean recalls being taunted by another child whose uncles served overseas (one later killed) because he had an uncle who was a farmer and remained safe at home. Those remaining, often WW1veterans, formed part of the Voluntary Defence Core generally known as the Home Guard and they trained regularly, initially with broomsticks and later with guns. They also checked that everyone was observing the blackout, covering windows and headlights to stop enemy aircraft locating targets. See interesting snippets re the VDC's war time exploits in the museum's reading room.

Women joined the Voluntary Service Detachment (a wartime off shoot of Red Cross in SA and WA) and trained in first aid and civil defence. In the museum you can view the Red Cross display and see the uniform the VSD women wore. Dean tells of ladies sitting on the roof top balcony on the Institute all night watching for pilots who were off course and they are reputed to have saved at least one pilot's life.

The school children did their bit too. Dean and his school mates in Stansbury collected bones, batteries and silver paper for the Schools Patriotic Fund and were awarded with badges for their efforts. During WW2 in SA, children collected over 2,433 tonnes of bones for fertiliser production.

Dean also remembers the town's men digging trenches across the road from the Stansbury School and the children "doing slit trench trials". Each child had a dilly bag containing barley sugar and bandages and other things on their school desk. They had to grab them and run across the road and jump into the trenches as quickly as they could. They were practising in case of enemy attacks coming to Stansbury!!!

The Stansbury community well and truly played their part in the defence of their country both on the home front and overseas.
