RECYCLING:

To help keep our town beautiful, and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available:

Nespresso pods: Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

Paper/Cardboard: There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full please leave the paper bundles under the verandah.

Soft plastics: These can also be placed in the cube if they are clean and appropriately packed. Please package the clean plastics into another bag or container for placement into the cube.

Bottles and cans: Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling have a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

Printer cartridges: These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

The Visitor Centre is also able to receive little plastic bread bag sealers, aluminium can pull tabs and used biros – no ink. However, we are ***no longer able to accept plastic screw lids, Colgate products or blister packs.***

EMERGENCY DEFIBRILLATORS:

In the event of cardiac arrest emergency defibrillators are situated at the following locations:

- Foreshore Caravan Park on the outside wall of the office to the left of the door.
- Oyster Point Drive Caravan Park, on the outside of the small red brick building adjacent to the entrance of the park.
- Stansbury Pharmacy on the outside, eastern wall.
- Stansbury Bowling Club on the club house wall facing the greens.
- Stansbury Golf Club on the front veranda of the club rooms.

These are automated and instructions are provided so please don't be afraid to use one. *You could save a life!*

It's the end of the financial year and we all know what that means. It's Tax Time! When the ATO decides if they owe you money or if you owe them!

You probably begrudge paying your legitimate tax bill so how much worse would it be if a scammer gets their hands on your hard earned dollars. Make no mistake, for scammers, tax time is bonanza time.

The scams take many different forms but at their heart they break down into two types.

Trying to get your or your businesses information, bank account details, superannuation accounts, online log in and passwords, crypto account wallet details or copies of your driver's licence and Medicare cards. They may advise you that you need to update your MyGov details:- sending you a link that looks like your MyGov page but in fact is a link straight to the scammer. or send you a form to complete to for a refund to be deposited into your account. These details can then be used to impersonate you and change the access details on your accounts and then to drain them.

The second type of tax scam revolves around the demand for immediate payment of a tax bill or fine. They may insist that your accounts have been used for money laundering and you need to hand over your money in fees to avoid your accounts being frozen. They may demand payment through gift card, cardless cash ATM withdrawals, couriers who conveniently will turn up to take cash straight from you or demanding you meet the 'Federal Agent' in person to hand over large sums of money either for fines or 'safekeeping'.

The Australian Tax Office will never demand monies in cash or gift cards. Our national government has no use for store or iTunes gift cards. They will not send couriers to pick up your cash.

The ATO does send SMS texts and emails and will even ring you, but they will NEVER demand immediate payment or threaten you with immediate arrest.

Real calls from the ATO will have "No Caller ID" on your phone. If you're not sure that it is the real ATO contacting you, hang up and call them back on 1800 008 540 to check. The real ATO will never send you an SMS or an email with a link to log in to their online services. They will also never ask you to return your personal details through SMS or email.

If in any doubt, speak to your tax agent, your bank or the call the ATO directly.

If you have clicked on a link or provided your personal information you can contact Service Australia's Scams and Identity help desk on 1800 941 126 or if you've paid money report it at cyber.gov.au/report

Don't be a victim.

STANSBURY PRIMARY SCHOOL

The school this term has been investigating the topic “Past and Present”. We started the inquiry with a visit to Kadina Shed Museum, an amazing place for children to start thinking about what the Past was like.

We asked our grandparents and the residents from Melaleuca questions about their childhood. The children were amazed that their mode of transport to school was a horse.

We started our own museum with items from the Past, which were brought into share - we had irons and pots; type writers and old toys.

The older students researched an item that they were interested in and then compared it with today's world making time lines to show major developments. Old washing machines were an interest to many. The younger children have investigated the differences between school in the Past and school today. The children are very happy the cane is no longer used in schools!

We finished off the topic with a “Back to the Past” school day. With fabulous outfits, desks in rows, line writing for those who misbehaved, handwriting with ink, and sewing just to name a few things we got up to. The highlight for most was the fire to make damper.

We also inquired in to life before Europeans arrived. Children were extremely intrigued by the “Stolen Generation”. We used a ‘reciprocal teaching’ strategy to analyse/comprehend Kevin Rudd’s ‘Sorry’ speech.



STANSBURY MUSEUM

The Stansbury Museum has many exhibits of locally handcrafted items and crafts. In years gone by, lots of people skillfully hand made items through necessity. Do you remember “mend and make do” and “bush mechanic”. People mended and repaired what they had or they made things themselves as they couldn’t get them in the country or they couldn’t afford them even if they could.

In the Clothing room are many examples of clothing and household items made by local women. It also displays haberdashery items and early machinery and aids that they used. In the early days, women sewed by hand using fine stitching and decorating garments with embroidery, smocking, beading and lacework that was all done by hand often by candle light. In the display cases are examples of local women’s skilled needlework including a completely hand stitched night gown that has a pleated and smocked bodice and also a handmade pure silk wedding dress made at Curramulka in 1900. There is a display of how lace is made by hand, using bobbins loaded with thread and moved over and under each other to make a pattern that is on a rotating drum.

The museum has so many examples of everyday items that were hand worked..... a peg bag, a beaded net jug cover with crocheted edging , fancy table cloths and aprons that have been embroidered by hand, a patchwork quilt, mantelpiece covers and a knitted counterpane.

In the early 1800s inventors in several countries were making “sewing machines” and the first mass produced and commercially successful sewing machine was made by Singer in 1850s in the US. As well as the Singer White Rotary treadle and the New Sterling National (another early treadle manufactured in the US), there is a fascinating very early portable Singer sewing that was believed to be hired out at one penny per day at Moonta. These machines were an absolute boon to both women in their homes and commercial clothing manufacturers.

Men, as well as hand making work implements and tools for farms and fishing, fashioned things for the home. In the dining room, there is a picture frame that was made by whittling many individual pieces of wood and then joining them together to make an intricate and unique frame that would have taken many hours of work.

In the bedroom, a hanger unit has been handcrafted by combining piece of brass curtain rod and hooks. There are also toys that were made from wood and metal and many of the dolls on display have had clothes lovingly made by hand by local women. There is a walking stick handcrafted with local timber displayed in the dining room.

All over the museum there are examples of handmade and handcrafted items and the tools that people used to make them.

Come and wonder at the skill and ingenuity of the folk who lived in this area before us who made so much with hard work and perseverance and without the technology of today.

Our Museum is open on Wednesdays and Sundays 2-4 pm and is a great place to bring children during the upcoming school holidays - there are so many treasures to discover!
