### **Visitor Information Office.**

It's been a steady month for visitors at the Centre, with the arrival of our older travellers for the post January school holiday period. Most caravan parks have been full in recent times, and we are enjoying the changing 'guard' of customers we've had through the Centre. We are certainly looking forward to seeing all our March visitors in to see our wide range of information on the local area and have a browse through the Centre as we have some beautiful gift ideas.

It's also time to start thinking about the cooler months. We've got a large range of hoodies, zipper hoodies and half zip hoodies in stock to suit everyone. ### **Access Advisory Working Party.**

Council's Access Advisory Working Party is made up of representatives from the local townships, with the focus on identifying any disability access issues with Council owned buildings or infrastructure. The working party has an annual budget for accessibility improvements and projects. It meets 4 times a year at Minlaton, so the commitment is not onerous.

## RECYCLING

To help keep our town beautiful and reduce waste the following recycling facilities are available: **Nespresso pods:** Used **Nespresso pods only** can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre into the box located by the front door.

**Paper/Cardboard:** There is a large white plastic cube in the yard at the Visitor Centre (entrance off Towler Street). Dry, flat packed newspapers, magazines (both secured with string) and cardboard can be placed in this cube. If the cube is full, please leave the paper bundles under the veranda.  
*No hypodermic needles please.*

**Bottles and cans:** Bottles and cans can be placed into the collection cages located around the town, or the blue and yellow bins in the caravan parks. Proceeds are distributed to the various local community groups and sporting clubs who participate in their collection. Alternately Stansbury Recycling has a bottle and can depot for all your refundable items and glass bottles.

**Printer cartridges:** These can be deposited into the Planet Ark box located near the front door of the Visitor Centre.

### Yellow Bin

As a reminder of what to put in the yellow kerb side recycling bin, we now have large fridge magnets from Green Industries. Pick up your free magnet from the Visitor Centre weekdays 9.30am-4pm.

### Blister Packs

Empty blister packs can be dropped off at the Visitor Centre in our designated box. Blister packs only, no plastic bags or cardboard.

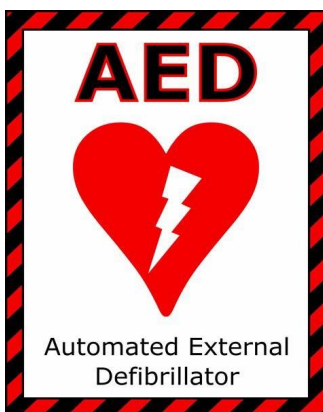


## IMPORTANT NOTE



## **STANSBURY SEAWALL UPDATE**

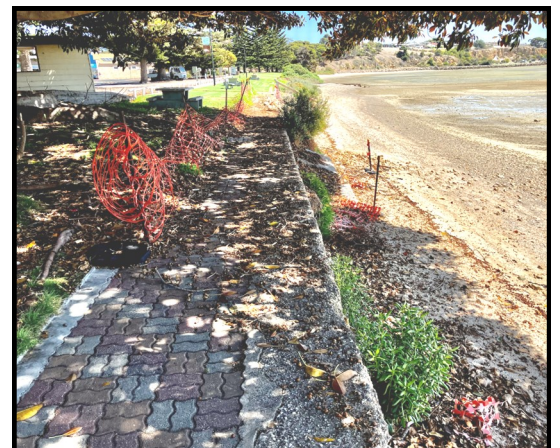

## STANSBURY MUSEUM

Do you remember when travelling on buses, trams and train in Adelaide in days gone by that the paper tickets had “ pithy sayings” or “inspirational messages” on them ? Had you ever wondered Who put them there? and Why?

They were the idea of Kenneth Leal who was the owner of Leal Printing. He was given permission by the State Transport Authority and a uniquely Adelaide tradition began. Ken’s mission was to cheer people up as they travelled and went about their daily lives.

For many years, over 90,000 travellers per week had tickets with these messages on them. Paper tickets are now a distant memory, a thing of the past!

Some humorous, some inspirational and thought provoking examples that were printed.

\*Howling success –the baby that gets picked up!\* \*Nylons: Sheer today, gone tomorrow\*

\*To find friendship, offer friendship\* \* A smile is a curve that sets everything straight\*

\*Mudslinging is lost ground\* \*Take time to laugh, it lightens life’s loads\*

\*Genius is one percent inspiration and ninety nine percent perspiration\*

\*True greatness is measured by the capacity to serve\* \*Truth is eternal\*

\*Laughter is a tranquilliser with no side effects\* \*Building boys is better than mending men\*

\*Drive carefully; remember it’s not only the car that can be recalled by its maker\*

Early public transport system in Adelaide

The horse drawn tram service began in 1878. It was not a speedy service. The trams (single or double story) were pulled by 2 horses and travelled at 6 miles (just under 10km) per hour). On rainy days, passengers on upper decks were issued with chaff bags to help keep them dry. What a difference to today’s air conditioned, speedy buses, trams and trains! This service continued until 1906. Adelaide was the first Australian city to use horse trams and the last to retire them.

Early transport to Stansbury

Initially settlement and development in South Australia depended on shipping and Yorke Peninsula towns like Stansbury (originally called Oyster Bay) were dependent on shipping until roads were established and motor transport became commonplace. Ketches (two masted sailing boats) were the lifeblood of remote coastal communities. They transported supplies, equipment, animals, mail and people to the Peninsula and on return trips took produce grown here to Port Adelaide.

There is an impressively large, wooden table in the museum’s big “shed”. It was cut and fashioned by axe and adze from a massive gum tree. This amazing piece of furniture served many generations of a local family. In 1874 it was transported to Stansbury from Morphett Vale via Port Adelaide on the ketch “Sailor Prince”. As well as the table, on board were the early settler and his family, all their possessions and supplies needed to set themselves up (including 2 casks of wine).

Therein lies an amusing story – come to the Museum yourself to discover it!
